

CLARIFICATION

A story in Wednesday's *Emerald* about campus bicycle policies may have led readers to believe that Office of Public Safety officers will impound bicycles that are not registered and sell them at auction.

Caroy Drayton, OPS director, said notices will be taped to unregistered bikes, reminding their owners to register bikes with his office. Registering a bike with OPS is free.

Drayton said a recovered stolen bike that is registered is easier to return to its owner, whereas returning an unregistered bike is difficult.

"We don't have the will or the energy to cut peoples' locks," Drayton said. "We're not out to

make a million dollars. We're out to promote public safety and the public good."

Drayton said OPS officers will impound bicycles if they are parked illegally or interfere with a building's disabled access. Impounded bikes will be returned to their owners, Drayton said, adding that OPS will accept registering the bike in lieu of a citation.

"That's the last thing on my mind is impounding bikes," he said. "It is stated in the regulations that people need to register their bikes. Again, it costs nothing to do so."
