'Tate' compels with warmth, humor

Newcomer Adam Hann-Byrd is unassuming and quietly spectacular as child genius Fred Tate. His character is a brilliant scholar as well as an artistic wonder. His far-reaching understanding of both facts and emotions is astounding.

Because of his brilliance, he has incredibly little by which to relate to his peers. Therefore, he is ostracized and has a strong relationship with only one person: his mother Dede:

Foster plays Fred's mother. She refuses to spoil him. Instead, she treats him as an equal. She's carefree, vigorous and amazingly unpretentious, considering the types of characters that usually inhabit a film

Dianne Wiest plays a specialist in the education and study of child prodigies. Believing she can fill a gap in Fred's life. she talks Dede into allowing red to join her school group of

geniuses and to go with them on a trip to an academic competition.

But Wiest is motivated by selfishness and a lust for her own fulfillment. Contrary to what would have been easy, she is not framed as a hate-worthy villain of the piece. In her rush to mold Fred in her own image, she alienates Dede and threatens to make Fred's precarious situation worse


This is an incredibly entertaining film filled with humor, warmth and a good amount of restraining the sentimentalism That is why Foster's character is so important in maintaining the integrity of the film.


There are some flaws worth

noting, however. There is too little exposition to set the movie in motion. The effect is jarring as the audience is simply thrown into his world. The ending comes too quickly. It moved from the tone setup in the last half of the film into a wholly different one without a good reason.

Other than those minor complaints, which come at the beginning and end, the film is compelling and beautiful. It's a movie about the heart and soul of important people, both average and extraordinary ones. It is likewise an important pic-
