State toughens alcohol control laws

Minors caught driving under the influence of intoxicants or using fake identification cards will now face bigger fines and a suspension of driving privileges due to recent changes in Oregon law.

Under the new changes, which began in late September, people younger than 21 who are arrested for driving under the influence will automatically fail their breath test, said Jim Walsh, Lane County's assistant district attorney. They will also face a 90-day suspension of driving privileges if there is any trace of alcohol in their bloodstream, he said.

People who refuse to take the blood test will have their driving privileges suspended for a full year.

Drivers over 21 can show up to an .08 percent blood alcohol content on the breath test without being guilty of driving under the influence, Walsh said. However, any trace of alcohol that shows up on minors' breath tests will lead to license suspension, he said.

Walsh said the new law will not give officers a greater right to stop people.

"An officer still has to have probable cause to believe a person is driving under the influence to stop the driver," Walsh said.

Another law change could affect minors who use false identification issued by the Motor Vehicles Division or an equivalent agency from another state.

Minors convicted of misrepresenting their age by using state-issued identification could have

their driving privileges suspended for up to a year, in addition to other penalties for using false identification, Walsh said.

In addition, any minor convicted of using false identification now faces a maximum penalty of a \$500 fine and up to 30 days in jail or 160 hours of community service, Walsh said.

Under a related law change, people between ages 18 and 21 who use false identification are now liable for the damages to stores that can result from selling alcohol to minors. Stores can be fined if they are convicted of doing so.

Now, if a store is fined because a customer used a fake ID to buy alcohol there, the store can sue the person for damages, including fines and attorney costs, Walsh said.

"This gives the licensee a chance to return the penalty to the users," said Peter O'Rourke, regional director of the Oregon Liquor Control Commission, which licenses stores to sell alcoholic beverages.

The penalty for first offense by a store that furnishes alcohol to a minor is a 10-day suspension of the store's liquor license and a \$650 fine, O'Rourke said.

"There's a lot of fake IDs out there, especially in the University area," O'Rourke said. On a busy weekend night, as many as 30 to 50 fake IDs might be seized by bars near campus, he said. The confiscated IDs are sent to the OLCC.

However, convictions for using false IDs are rare, O'Rourke said. OLCC has only two investigators assigned to track down all the people who use fake ID, he said.
