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Conspiracy theories

The theory of a conspiracy will come up again next month, perhaps stronger than ever, with the release of the Oliver Stone movie *JFK*.

Southwell said she tends to dismiss such theories in general and in the case of the Kennedy assassination.

"If you assassinate one leader or one president, I don't think it changes anything," she said.

"A right wing group or the USSR would be more sophisticated than to just remove one man, it would take much more to radically alter U.S. policies," Southwell said.

The assassinations of civil rights leader Martin Luther King, Sen. Robert Kennedy and the attempts on former Presi-

dents Gerald Ford and Ronald Reagan, were, from what we know, individually motivated attacks, Southwell said.

"I have no reason to think this wasn't also," she said.

Whalen isn't as certain.

"At the time, I was certainly willing to believe that Lee Harvey Oswald sat up in that corridor and shot him alone," said Whalen. "But I've never felt that I could really reach a defi-

nite conclusion."

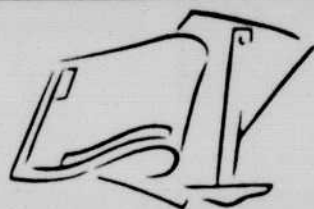
Whalen said he does not believe the Warren Commission did a complete job.

"I think they concluded ahead of time that there was a single assassin," he said.

"Their job was to quell fear of a conspiracy. Can you imagine the impact that would have had on the American psyche? A lone gunman, sure, anyone can believe that one person did it. You can deal with that, that doesn't threaten the fabric of a democratic society."
