# Men's b-ball to face Grizzly reception

Coach Don Monson would like for his Oregon men's basketball team to get used to playing in front of rowdy crowds. The Ducks will get their chance this weekend, but it won't be at McArthur Court.

Oregon will travel to Missoula, Mont., to face the University of Montana Grizzlies tonight at 6:05 p.m., and Monson is wary of the Dahlberg Arena crowd.

"They have kind of a hostile crowd there," he said. "This team's reaction to a hostile crowd is something they need to experience. Unfortunately, Missoula is not the best place to start it.

Starting junior point guard Andre Collier, a junior college transfer playing in his first Division-l game, said he isn't worried about the crowd.

"I'm looking forward to the game," he said. "The crowd has no effect on me. You have to block the fans out because everywhere you go there's going to be fans.

The Grizzlies are the defending Big Sky Conference champions and made it to the NCAA Basketball Tournament last year before being eliminated in the first round by Nevada Las Vegas. They have only played one game this year, an 87-56 triumph over Simon Fraser.

The Ducks are coming off a victory over the Iceland National Team two weeks ago in a game that gave Monson a chance to look at his batch of young players.

Since the Iceland game, Oregon has been riddled by the flu and other ailments. Last week four players came down with the flu, sophomore forward Jordy Lyden sat out the entire week with a hyperextended

knee, and sophomore forward Eric van der Veen fractured his index finger.

Monson said the injuries set the team back

"I thought we'd improved quite a bit up to the Iceland game," he said. "But last week was not a real good week because of the injuries and the

Lyden's injury was of extra concern to Monson.

"Lyden was the one kid I thought we couldn't lose," Monson said. "He'll play against Montana, but it's obvious he's out of condition from the week off.

Oregon's starting lineup for


the game will remain the same as it was against Iceland: Lyden and sophomore Clyde Jordan at forwards, Collier and freshman Orlando Williams at guards and senior Chuck Patterson at cen-

Monson said he thought freshmen Johnny Reece, Jeff Potter and Damon Runyon would also get substantial playing time and said he was especially pleased with the performance so far of Potter.

"The biggest surprise of the season is the presence Potter has made," Monson said. "He helps out with rebounding and defending the post, which is something we need help with."
