The University-owned land also boasts a private beach and 28 acres of forest land with hiking and mountain bike trails.

Burdick said that students usually find plenty to do, both academically and socially.

"At the beginning of the term, everyone goes home for the weekend, but by the end of the term, no one leaves," she said. "People become like fami-

Before classes begin, students tour and become familiar with Charleston, even attending town hall meetings. In return, many Charleston residents attend the end-of-term open showing of student projects.

Burdick said classes are scheduled in the mornings, with afternoons left free. One day a week, usually Wednesdays or Thursdays, is left open for students to work on their projects.

Students pay standard tuition for their coursework, and financial aid can be used. Burdick said. The room and board costs are similar to the main campus residence halls.

Residence hall students need

not be deterred by the thought of selling their dorm contract to be able to sign up for the program. University Housing Director Michael Eyster said residents can petition to be released from their contracts.

"It's standard to release students from their contracts for academic reasons such as the coast program," he said.

Students wanting to return to the dorms next fall should also petition to be allowed to participate in returning resident signups spring term. Questions about the petition process can be directed to the housing office at 346-4277.

Spaces in the coast program are first come, first served. Burdick said about 15 students have already signed up. Applications are available in the coast program office in EMU

Students interested in the program are encouraged to sign up for a van trip to OIMB scheduled for Jan. 11, 1992.


