## Montana trounces cold-shooting Ducks 78-39

Saturday's Oregon men's basketball game at Montana was the first Division-I contest of the season for the team, and many Duck fans may be wishing it was the last.

Montana kicked the Ducks out of Missoula with a 78-39 victory in a game that could be a sign of the things to come for the young Oregon team.

The Ducks shot a miserable 17 percent from the field in the first half and only 24 percent for the game as they were simply outmanned by the more experienced Grizzlies.

"Offensively, we were just so inept that we were never in the ballgame," Oregon coach Don Monson said. "We were jogging through screens and jogging through the offense, and obviously they were a little tight."

Montana, the defending Big Sky Conference champions, improved its record to 2-0 on the season.


Sophomore Jordy Lyden, who is expected to be the biggest offensive threat for the Ducks this year, scored only six points on 2 of 11 shooting from the field. Guards Andre Collier and Johnnie Reece also struggled, hitting a combined 3 of 19.

"Jordy's timing was off a little bit," Monson said. "We need to get something out of Lyden, (Clyde) Jordan and Collier to be successful and competitive at all."

Trailing 33-16 at halftime, Oregon got stomped even harder to open the second half. Montana went on a 16-2 run to take a insurmountable 49-18 lead early in the second half. The Grizzly lead grew to as many 40 in the second half.

One of the few bright spots for the Ducks was the play of freshman guard Orlando Williams. Williams was the leading scorer for Oregon with 12 points on 5 of 9 shooting, including 2 of 5 from three-point range.

The Ducks were outrebounded by Montana 48-34. Jordan, a sophomore forward was the top Oregon rebounder with 8, but he fouled out midway through the second half.

The Oregon volleyball team ended a disappointing, injury-plagued season Saturday with a three-game loss to fifthranked UCLA in Los Angeles.

The 15-12, 15-6, 15-4 loss dropped the Ducks' season record to 14-16 and 4-14 in the Pacific-10 Conference. It was only Oregon's fifth losing season in 19 years of competition.

The Ducks hit a solid 268 for the match, but it wasn't good enough against the Bruins' 367 mark. UCLA also had 68 kills to Oregon's 52.

Senior Dawnn Charroin closed out a stellar career at Oregon with a teamhigh 13 kills. Charroin ranks as the fourth alltime leader in kills for the Ducks.

Seniors All Watkins and two-year captain Mindee Adams, who missed much of the season with a stress fracture of the shin, added 12 and 11 kills, respectively.

Two other Ducks also finished their careers Saturday. Setter Molly McGrath had 43 assists, and outside hitter Julie Jeffery contributed three blocks while seeing action in just one game.

UCLA, the defending NCAA champion, improved its records to 23-5 overall and 14-2 in the Pac-10.

Oregon also played tough Friday night against USC but lost a hard-fought match 15-10, 16-14, 15-2 to the Tro-
