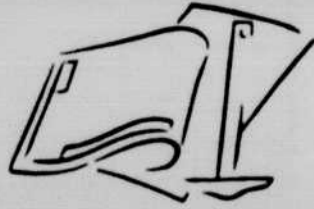


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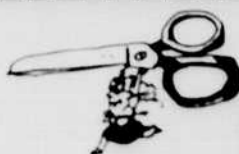
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CAMPUS UPDATE

Groups to switch EMU offices

At least four student offices in the EMU will relocate following the recent completion of the EMU Board of Directors space audit.

The board's House Committee conducted the audit to determine the best way to reallocate space in the student union building. The audit was necessary in part because campus radio station KVAK, formerly KRMA, needed a bigger space than it had to begin broadcasting.

The Office of Student Advocacy needed another room to house its Defender Division, which was placed in Room 336 in September. That room was previously the Incidental Fee Committee office. The IFC was moved to Room 4, previously the Photo ID office. However, IFC members were unhappy with the new office because it had less space and room for only two desks.

In the latest decision by the House Committee, the IFC will move into Room 15B, which will be partitioned to create two offices. The other half of the room will house Innovative Educational Development, which will move from its current office in Room 110 on the mezzanine level.

The EMU building supervisor's office, also on the mezzanine level, will become the new KVAK office. The building supervisor will move to Room 110. There are proposals for future use of Room 4, but nothing has been decided yet.

Frank Geltner, EMU associate director, said the plans are contingent upon construction bids that are being submitted this week. Each of the changes involves some work, Geltner said, such as placement of new doors and partitions and electrical work.

After the bids are received, the board will review the EMU Building Repair and Reserve Fund to determine if there are enough funds to make the changes. Geltner said the changes necessary for the new KVAK office will be funded by that group, however.

CBS still selling Olympic time

NEW YORK (AP) — The CBS Television Network confirmed Monday it is still seeking buyers for 17 percent of the commercial time in its coverage of the 1992 Winter Olympic Games, which start in about two months.

But CBS spokesman George Schweitzer said the network was confident that it would find buyers for all of the time at "good pricing."

CBS has agreed to pay \$243 million for the right to broadcast coverage of the games. It plans to provide about 116 hours of programming from the games over 16 days starting Feb. 8 in Albertville, France.

The Wall Street Journal, which reported on the unsold inventory in Monday's editions, said TV ad time was all but sold out months in advance of previous Olympic games and that analysts expect CBS will lose money on the 1992 games.

Schweitzer declined to comment on whether the network expects to make a profit on the games, but said that ad sales are "on schedule."

He conceded, however, that the depressed state of the economy and sluggish demand for ad time in sports programming has made it more difficult to sell the Olympic commercials.



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
