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Oregon nets losses at Far West Classic

The return of the Far West Classic wasn't all it was cracked up to be for the Oregon men's basketball team.

Minnesota and LaSalle demolished the Ducks on consecutive nights in the two-day, four-team tournament held at Portland's Memorial Coliseum Dec. 27-28, where the Ducks finished last.

The Ducks were pushed around by a bigger Minnesota squad, losing 89-64 In the opening game of the tournament.

Oregon hung tough with the Gophers in the first half but gave in after halftime.

The first big blow hit the Ducks early in the first half when junior point guard Andre Collier picked up his third foul with Oregon trailing by nine at 16-7.

Minnesota coach Clem Haskins said the loss of Collier was a big advantage for his team.

"Any time you lose your starting point guard, it's going to have a negative effect on your team," Haskins said. "When Collier picked up his third foul, we knew it was a big break for us."

Collier was replaced by junior Antoine Stoudamire, who was playing in his hometown for the first time since graduating from Jesuit High School. Stoudamire ended weeks of speculation by opting to play for the Ducks this year rather than a redshirt season, which he and coach Don Monson had hinted at in past weeks.

Stoudamire promptly hit a three-pointer to pull Oregon within six at 16-10. Minnesota then went on an 8-2 run to take a 24-12 lead with just over nine minutes left in the half.

A Clyde Jordan tip-in cut the lead to 26-19, but the Gophers built their lead back up and led 33-20 after forward Dana Jackson scored and was fouled for a three-point play.

Oregon, however, rebounded again with back-to-back lay-ins by sophomore forward Jordy

Lyden and another three-pointer by Stoudanire to make the score 33-27 with five minutes.

The first half ended with back-to-back treys by Duck freshman Johnnie Reece and Gopher forward Randy Carter as Minnesota went into the locker room with 45-34 lead.

Minnesota got serious in the second half and put the defensive clamps on the Ducks as they outscored Oregon 25-7 in the first seven minutes of the half to take its biggest lead of the game, 70-41.

Haskins said it was no mistake the Gophers came out so intense.

"We wanted to dominate the first five minutes of the second half," he said. "We wanted to put pressure on them right off the bat, and I think we did a good job of doing that."

Lyden said his team just got impatient.

"They were doing a good job of powering the ball inside," he said. "On the other hand, we were just taking some poor shots, myself included."

Three-pointers by Reece, Jordan and freshman guard Orlando Williams helped Oregon cut the lead to 78-61, but that was as close as the Ducks got.

Monson said his team may have been in awe of the Big Ten team.

"We didn't play aggressive,

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
