they felt they deserved last year and probably would have gotten had they not lost their last four games.

All five starters return from last year, and the Cougars have jumped out to a quick 12-1 start this year, but most of the wins have come against opponents far below Pac-10 caliber

Due to a stellar recruiting class that is considered one of the best in the country, Cal coach Lou Campanelli may just get the 16 wins he needs to become the school's all-time win-

ningest coach.

The Golden Bears (6-4) were part of the fifth-place logjam last season at 8-10, and they finished 13-15 overall.

Cal did lose three starters, but Brian Hendrick (17 ppg) is one of three returning doublefigure scorers.

The big news in Berkeley is the incoming crop of recruits.

At the top of the list is 6-foot-8 Alfred Grigsby, who chose Cal over the likes of Ohio State, Arkansas, Georgetown and Oklahoma. Grigsby is leading the Pac-10 in field goal percentage at almost 67 percent.

Things don't change much

up in Gill Coliseum, and this year's Oregon State team shouldn't be an exception.

Head coach Jim Anderson. who has been in Corvallis as a player or coach since 1957, has Scott Haskin back, who missed last year with an injury

The 6-foot-10 Haskin had an excellent season two years ago, and Anderson is more than glad to have his big man back.

"It'll be a pretty similar team to last year's," Anderson said. "We don't diverge much at Oregon State."

Anderson also has a strong group from last year's 8-10 (14-14 overall) team, but the

strongest of the bunch may not be around for the league schedule. Chad Scott, a 6-foot-7 forward who is leading the Beavers in scoring and rebounding. may be be forced to leave the school for academic reasons.

If that happens, returning guard Mario Jackson and newcomers Brent Barry and Earnest Killum may have to step forward.

Oregon State enters Pac-10 play with an 8-5 record, but the Beavers have been downright ugly in losses to Fresno State and James Madison.

USC went to the NCAA tournament last year for the first time since 1985, and George Raveling has one player who can do a lot to get the Trojans there again.

With 6-foot-5 All-American shoo-in Harold Miner anchoring a strong backcourt, the Trojans have jumped out to an 8-2 start, including a win over then fourth-ranked Ohio State.

We're getting there slowly but surely," Raveling said. "I'm happy with our progress. I like where we are right now.

Marcus Whitfield, who led all junior-college scorers last year with 31 points per game, may be counted on for some added scoring.

Raveling thinks his team might duplicate last year's suc-


