Admittedly, Croatia and Serbia don't provide millions of barrels of oil to the world each day. I wonder if the American public would get another geography lesson if they did.

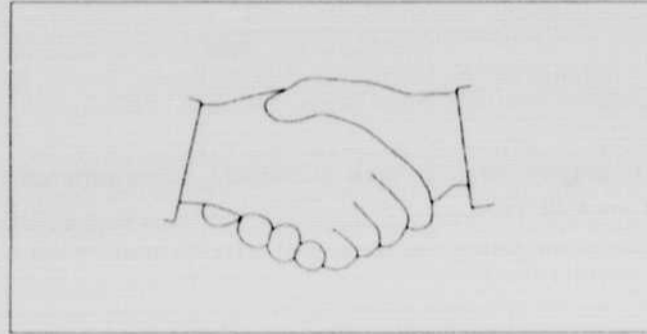
