doctor of comedy. Or both. Voted 1991 College and University Comedian of the Year, Berry holds a Ph.D. in sociology and is a former professor - one who just happens to be funny.

Knowing exactly what to make of her hasn't been easy for anyone. She is either a) a comedienne who happens to be scholarly, b) a gifted lecturer/speaker with a comic edge, or c) a comic with a serious message on stage. It's hard to fail this Bertice Berry Profile

"She has a comedic intelligence that's hard to come by," said Frank Geltner, faculty advisor for the EMU Cultural orum. "She's able to fuse the p between cultures.


