letes that wouldn't get into school."

The argument of many of those in favor of the changes at the meeting said higher eligibility requirements would inspire a student-athlete to perform better academically in high school.

Joe Wade, director of academic advising and student services, said that's a "very naive statement." He said the fact that student-athletes are graduating at a higher rate than the general student body in some colleges and universities is evidence that student-athletes are an equally strong academic group.

"Why should we continue to hold student-athletes to higher standards than general students?" Wade asked.

If society is to expect strong efforts from college student-athletes, high schools need to take a more active role in educating their student-athletes, said Clarence Spigner, an assistant professor in school and community health.

Spigner, who is personally not against the new legislation, thinks both high school coaches and teachers need to help student-athletes concentrate on their school work.

"I don't think (high school coaches and teachers) have done all they have been able to do," Spigner said. "Coaches get paid to win games, and we get paid to educate."

Traveling to the national meeting last week from the University were athletic director Bill Byrne; associate athletic director Barb Walker; Gary Gray, the assis-

tant athletic director in charge of student services; and James O'Fallon, University faculty representative to the NCAA.

O'Fallon, a University law professor, said the University voted in favor of all academic proposals brought before the Presidents Commission. Along with O'Fallon, University President Myles Brand, Vice President Dan Williams, and Richard Francisco, chair of the intercollegiate athletics committee, all decided in early December on how the University would vote on the issues.

O'Fallon also said a proposal to deny eligibility to Proposition 48 student-athletes failed to pass.

Under Proposition 48, student-athletes not meeting the 2.0 GPA and 700 SAT score requirements must lose a

year of athletic eligibility before being allowed to play the remaining three years. O'Fallon said the failed proposal would have entirely left out students not meeting these requirements.

Walker said the University would not be as affected as many of the schools it competes with because the University's academic requirements are already fairly high.

In other changes made by the Presidents Commission, a proposal passed last year to eliminate one full-time football assistant was reversed.

Another proposal passed at last year's convention by the commission to reduce the number of coaches on Division I wrestling staffs was reversed, but Oregon wrestling coach Ron Finley said it won't affect his program greatly.

## Oregon plans rude welcome for Cal teams

Oregonians have long been known for their notoriously poor treatment of visitors from their neighboring southern state.

The Oregon wrestling team hopes to keep the tradition alive and play the role of an ungracious host this weekend as three California state schools, including No. 17 Fresno State, invade McArthur Court for consecutive dual meets tonight, Saturday and Sunday.

Along with Fresno State, Pacific-10 Conference rivals Cal-State Fullerton and Cal-State Bakersfield will be in Eugene to try and stop the Ducks' eight-match dual meet winning streak.

Oregon coach Ron Finley anticipates tonight's match with Fresno State will be the most difficult.

"Fresno State is a tough school because they have a strong wrestler in each weight division," Finley said. "They are one of the top teams in the Western Athletic Conference and they should have several individuals in the NCAA meet."

Fresno State's top wrestler is Gerry Abas, a freshman who sports a 20-2 record and is ranked seventh in the NCAA. Other top wrestlers for the Bulldogs include Harold Zinkin at 134 pounds (18-3) and Lorenzo Neal in the heavyweight division (6-1).

"If we have a good weekend, it will be a great chance to move up in the national rankings," said Finley, whose team is ranked 23rd. "But it will be tough; we aren't facing any weak teams this weekend. Each of these teams could beat us if we don't wrestle well."

Despite the physical toll of three matches in three days, Finley hopes to use the same lineup in each match. Jason Muggy, the Duck's top wrestler at 142 pounds, is injured and will be replaced by Jason Jones.

"I think Jason will do a fine job replacing Muggy," Finley said. "He has a lot of Pac-10 experience."

Top performers for the Ducks in the early season have included Dan Vidlak at 118 pounds (9-1), Jarrett Clark at 126 (10-3) and Cory Sonnen at 134 (9-2-1).

"Every one of our wrestlers in the lower weight classes has been outstanding," Finley said.
