predators like speculators and rip-off artists," the Oregon Democrat said.

"We have a president with a new world odor that smells of his racist and sexist politics," DeFazio said.

Springfield Mayor Bill Morrisette said King found and invoked a fundamental collective morality in all Americans.

"Dr. King did his part to stop the KKK; now I'm asking you to do your part and stop the OCA," Morrisette said.

Marion Malcolm of Clergy and Laity Concerned had the women in the audience yell

"freedom!" and "justice!" to be sure "the voice of women was heard."

She praised King for recognizing that racism, militarism and poverty degrade humanity. Malcolm said the best way to honor King was to become active in the community.

The speakers addressed a crowd of more than 300 people at the commemoration.

The march started simultaneously at 2 p.m. at both the EMU Courtyard and South Eugene High School. Both marches eventually united at 11th Avenue and High Street and finished with a rally at the Eugene Hilton.

Banners for Queer Nation and MECHA and placards decrying the Oregon Citizens Alliance were carried among the diverse marchers.

Entering the Hilton marchers chanted, "What do we want? Justice! When do we want it? Now!"

ried about other abortion rights cases in courts around the country that pose a threat to Roe vs. Wade.

"It seems inevitable that the Supreme Court is going to overturn Roe vs. Wade," Schoap said. "If not in one overt gesture, then piece by piece."

In preparation for the possible overturn, pro-choice groups are trying to get the Freedom of Choice Act passed in Congress. That would create a federal law declaring Roe vs. Wade the "law of the land," Schoap said.

The act was submitted in both the U.S. House and Senate in 1990 and 1991 and continues to gather sponsors every year, Schoap said. Although this is a slow process to create a law, she said it's the only way to go."

Moreover, she said pro-choice people are working to elect pro-choice legislators at every level of government and on getting the controversial abortion pill, RU 486 legalized.
