

Professor to speak about sociology for women

Dorothy Smith, professor of sociology in education at the Ontario Institute for Studies in Education, will present a public lecture titled "Reaffirming a Sociology for Women," at 3:30 p.m. today in the EMU Gumwood Room.

State continues scholarships for minorities

The Oregon State System of Higher Education plans to continue its Underrepresented Minorities Achievement Scholarship Programs for freshmen and juniors in the 1992-93 school year.

The purpose of the current minority programs is to encourage and assist underrepresented students of color to enroll in state system colleges and universities.

Underrepresented students include African-American, Alaskan Native American and Hispanic-American students.

The UMASP scholarship, worth about \$2,500 per year, is renewable for up to five years for the freshman program and three years for the junior program. Students must be Oregon residents, eligible for regular admission and demonstrate academic merit and achievement.

Applications for the freshman program are available at high school counseling offices, and have a March 1 deadline. Applications for the junior program are available at community college counseling offices or the admissions office at the school the student is applying to, and have a May 1 deadline.
