## Rich Little claims to be 'victim' in sordid legal saga

LAS VEGAS (AP) — Comedian Rich Little said Wednesday he would like for his seamy legal saga with magician Melinda Saxe to disappear — but concedes it's unlikely the story will go away anytime soon.

"I was a sap, a patsy, a victim," Little told reporters hours after a federal judge lifted a gag order prohibiting the two from

discussing the case. Saxe filed a lawsuit in December over a videotape Little made in 1988 of the two entertainers having sex.

Little said earlier appearances by the magician on the tabloid television show *Hard Copy* had been "disastrous" for both of them.

"If she's a magician, why doesn't she just make this

whole thing disappear," Little said. "I say let's drop it and get on with our lives, but I don't think that's gonna happen."

Saxe's attorney, Charles McCrea, said his client had no intention of dropping the lawsuit.

Little, 53, said Wednesday that Saxe, 28, knew of the taping.

### Tourism continues to grow in Eugene-Springfield

More and more people are requesting information about the Eugene-Springfield area, continuing a trend of tourism's growth in the area.

The Eugene/Springfield Convention and Visitors Bureau reports that 17,358 requests for information about the area were made in 1991, a 7 percent increase in requests over 1990.

The bureau reports that most of the requests came from California, although requests from California were down from 1990.

Moreover, requests from Japan were up 18 percent over 1990, an increase the visitors bureau expects to continue in the coming years.

### City seeks input on dog off-leash program

The city of Eugene is asking the public for input on a pilot program that allows dog owners to exercise their dogs without a leash in designated park sites.

Citizens residing near the sites, and people who either signed a petition or mailed a letter to the city about the dog leash issue, will be asked to respond to a mailed questionnaire.

The designated park sites include the Wayne Morse Ranch park in south Eugene, Gilham Park in the Willakenzie area and Candlelight Park in the Bethel area.

Moreover, a public hearing is planned for Feb. 13 at 7 p.m. to allow others from the community a chance to voice their opinions.

The Eugene Parks and Recreation Commission will review the findings from the public hearing and the questionnaires and develop a proposal.
