

Hockey Ducks shoot to a scoring weekend

The Oregon club hockey team used unselfish play and a lot of hard hitting to dismantle a quality California squad this weekend by scores of 6-1 Saturday and 9-3 Sunday.

All three Oregon lines skated well on Sunday and passed the puck with exceptional accuracy in coasting to a six-goal win. Centers Paul Paquin and Ned White each scored two goals as a total of seven Ducks found the net.

Head coach Shane Peters, making his debut at the helm of the Ducks, was pleased with the scoring distribution among the three Oregon lines.

"The team really played together as lines (this weekend)," Peters said. "When you have nine goals and nobody with three, three separate units are really being productive."

Dominating is a better word. Rough work in the defensive zone by Mark Liebert and Nevin Harper repeatedly turned away California chances and allowed the Ducks to keep the action in front of the opponent's net.

Weekend totals for shots on goal illustrate the Duck dominance, as Oregon outshot the Golden Bears 82-47 in two games.

Oregon made quick work of their Bear-hunting on Super Bowl Sunday, going ahead in the first minute on center Richard Tucker's goal.

After knotting the score at 2-2, California players went into their hibernation routines, induced by fatigue and bruised bodies, and were outscored 7-0 over the next minutes.

California coach Howard Jenks acknowledged the fact that having only two lines didn't help, but he couldn't keep from editorializing on the officiating.

"It's a good thing that they give the officials a break between the second and third periods so they can read the rulebook," an upset

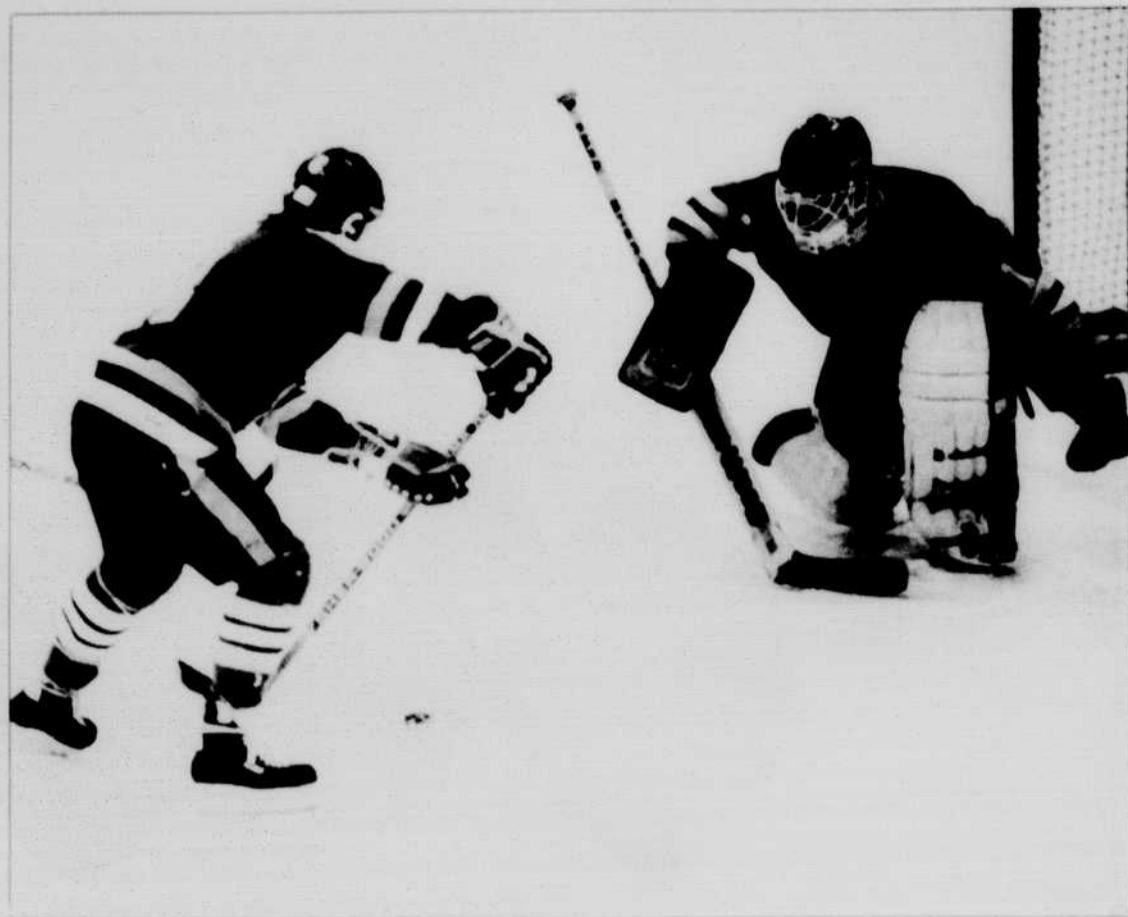

Wrestling Ducks manage to win one, lose one

The Oregon wrestling team didn't let a Friday night loss keep the Ducks from returning to their winning ways Saturday.

Oregon fell 24-18 at Boise State Friday on its second loss of the season, but the Ducks bounced back for a 23-13 win Saturday at Brigham Young.

The 23rd-ranked Ducks, 7-2 overall and 3-1 in the Pacific-10 Conference, next wrestle Wednesday night against Oregon State at McArthur Court.

Senior Dan Vidlak started Oregon off against BYU on its usual strong foot in dual meets. The 118-pounder beat John McInoy 24-9 for the most lopsided victory of the night.

Oregon's Jarrett Clark followed that up with an 8-2 win over Kelton Anderson.

The Ducks finished the match off strong, winning the last three matches for the triumph.

Solomon Fulp outlasted Wright Noel, 4-3, in the 177-pound category, and 190-pounder Scott Myers beat Albert Olsen 6-5. Heavyweight Chris Anderson finished off the Cougars with an 11-1 win over Shawn Ponce.

Oregon wasn't so fortunate Friday night in its first Pac-10 loss.

Vidlak, ranked third in the nation, again got things going for the Ducks. He put Oregon up on the board first with a 19-3 win over Boise State's Larry Duran.

Clark kept the Ducks up by winning the second match of the day, 9-1, over Chris Ward. Other Duck winners included Myers over Brandon Ferguson, 13-5, and Anderson over Eric Givens, 8-3.

Boise State got six points from Nels Nelson, the sixth-ranked 150-pounder. Nelson pinned Oregon freshman Tom Glenn at 2:57 into the match.

pulling down 13 boards and adding 16 points.

Reece played as a reserve for the first time in five games and looked to prove himself.

When he checked in, the Huskies were on the verge of taking over the game as they built up a 10-point lead. But Reece came in and nailed a short jumper to make the score 30-22.

Reece then hit a three-pointer and threw a perfect alley-oop to sophomore Clyde Jordan to pull Oregon within five at 32-27. One more three-pointer by Reece and the Ducks trailed only 34-30.

Reece's performance seemed to spark the team for the rest of the half. Jordan and freshman Orlando Williams both added three-pointers of their own and in a fitting end to the half, Reece hit still another trey to

give Oregon its first lead at 43-42.

Reece said he knew when he got into the game, he had to do something quick.

"We had to get momentum," he said. "I've been in a slump, but coach told me to keep taking my shots. After my first few shots, I knew I was on."

Oregon players gave a lot of credit to the Duck fans who were extremely supportive after nearly booing the Ducks off the court Thursday against Washington State.

"We figured if we played well," Stoudamire said. "The crowd would support."

"The crowd knows when you're playing hard," Reece added, "and tonight they let us know we were playing well."

The Ducks are in for a tough weekend coming up as they face No. 11 Arizona on Thursday and Arizona State on Saturday.
