and baffled Jenks said. "They don't seem to know the difference between USA and NCAA rules."

On Saturday night, wing Mike McHugh put on a passing clinic by consistently putting the puck on teammates' sticks in the California crease. The assistant captain from Salt Lake City totaled three assists by helping wings Brian Clendenin, Todd Holthe and Tom Lerra get into the scoring column.

"Mike was like a fork out there — feeding people," said captain Scott Brown, who sat out both games because of illness.

The goal by Holthe was his second short-handed score of the night. Earlier he had put the Ducks up 4-1 with a dazzling series of moves, beating three Bear defenders and the goalie during a two-man Duck disadvantage.

Liebert could see a definite difference in the Duck home games compared to the one two months ago, in which Oregon beat the Bears 2-1 in Berkeley.

"We came out flying with a lot more intensity and a lot more hitting," Liebert said after Saturday's win. "And they played like they had just got off a plane."

At times the Ducks were over-aggressive and the game got a little ugly, as was evident in the scorecard: Oregon tallied 48 penalty minutes to 30 for the Bears. Liebert alone drew ten minutes with his ferocious style.

"For a while (on Saturday) things got sloppy and a bit chippy," McHugh said. "Sunday we had just six penalty minutes and were able to return to a more finesse-oriented passing game, which is what we like to play."

Defenseman Jeremy Kaplan said the more mellow nature of Sunday's game helped avoid unnecessary penalties.

"By being less aggressive, we were able to be in the game even more than last night," Kaplan said following the 9-3 blowout.

Oregon goalies John O'Donnell and Tom Bahls proved nearly impervious over the weekend, combining to stop 43 of the Bears' 47 shots on goal.

In a rare start, Bahls made 18 saves on Sunday and amazing glove work by O'Donnell helped him stop 25 California chances.

Oregon is home again next weekend for two games against league rival San Jose State, a team that already beat the Ducks this year, 7-6 in overtime. McHugh said he is looking forward to the rematch.

"They play a fast-paced game that matches up real well with ours," McHugh said.

Oregon beat San Jose State at Lane County Ice last year, scoring a dramatic game-winning goal with only six seconds remaining in the game.
