Wrestlers to face off in Civil War

Ducks have dominated last four, but a tough Beaver squad could end the streak

Since the 1987 season, Oregon has had no problem pushing Oregon State around on the wrestling mat.

But don't expect the 15thranked Beavers to be patsies tonight when they face off against the 23rd-ranked Ducks in McArthur Court at 7:30.

Oregon State leads in the history of Civil War matchups 57-17-1, but Oregon has dominated the meeting during the past four seasons, winning the last seven matches against its cross-state rival.

The Beavers have not beaten the Ducks since a 1987 match that saw Oregon State win 20-16, but the schools did tie 17-17 in 1988.

Tonight's match should provide the best clash between the two schools in recent memory because Oregon State's ranking is higher than Oregon's.

"It should be an exciting match," Oregon coach Ron Finley said.

The Ducks have been wrestling well this season, too, but last Friday, Oregon (7-2 overall and 3-1 in the Pacific-10 Conference) was surprised by Boise State for only its second loss of the season. Injuries have debilitated the team's progress, but the season is still young, Finley said.

Oregon State is off to a 6-1 overall and 3-0 Pac-10 start, its only loss coming at the hands of national-power Fresno State. Oregon's first loss this year was to Fresno State.

"I expect a very tough (Oregon State) team," Finley said. "They've been wrestling very well."

One wrestler doing particularly well is Oregon State's Babak Mohammadi. The fourth-ranked 126-pound sophomore was an All-American as a freshman and is 21-1 in matches this season.

Oregon's Jarrett Clark has the pleasure of facing Mohammadi tonight, a match that will be important to the Ducks, Finley said.

"I expect it to be close and a key match for us," Finley said.

The Ducks' strong point during this season's dual meets has been their starts. Third-ranked 118-pounder Dan Vidlak, Oregon's first wrestler in every match, is 8-0 in dual meets this year, and Clark, who is 8-1 in duals, follows him up as the second wrestler.

Oregon State sports a number of the country's other top wrestlers, too. Trent Flack (19-4 at 167 pounds), Ryan Sugai (22-1 at 142) and heavyweight Matt Willhite (15-5-1) are all ranked nationally.

Finley said it was going to take all his team had to beat the Beavers, including good crowd support.

"We're going to need a lot of help from our fans to root our guys on," Finley said.
