

CADAVERS

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"You need to put a glove on and work on a cadaver," Truong said of the open labs. "There's no way you can learn it from a book."

Jennifer Horton is the teaching assistant for the Wednesday night open lab. She said her job is mainly to answer questions that students might have.

Horton has always been enthusiastic about anatomy, and became an assistant after taking Human Anatomy as a requirement for her master's degree in occupational therapy.

"In their own sort of bizarre way, the insides are kind of cool too," she said, explaining her fascination with the subject.

The labs are important in illustrating the details of anatomy that are lost on charts or models.

"Everything's fairly clearly laid out on a chart," Horton said, "and then you walk over to a body and say, 'Hey, it doesn't look so clear over here.'"

"The labs are set up to be a practical experience," Troyanek said, "where people can see and touch structures we're learning about in class and get a real understanding of how things fit together."

The cadavers come from Oregon Health Sciences University in Portland, and were people who chose to donate their bodies to science. Two cadavers, a male and a female, are picked up each spring to join the two already being used in the class. A team of dissectors prepares them for the Human Anatomy classes, which study the cadav-

ers for two terms.

"It is extremely rare for a non-medical school to have real cadavers," Troyanek said. "It's a fantastic opportunity."

Many students remembered feeling uneasy about the first anatomy lab they attended. But Troyanek, who has taught anatomy classes for six years at the University, is "unaware of anyone getting sick or being totally upset from seeing cadavers."

"This is the first time I've ever been around dead people," said Patrick Varga, a general science major, "so I was kind of wondering about it. I kind of like the people now, but just in a different way."

The odor is often a problem for people, Troyanek said. He said that the odor from the preservatives gets on people's hands, and can't be washed off with soap and water.

Horton agreed, saying, "The only thing that ever bugged me about this class was that I smelled funny afterwards."

For those who find anatomy fascinating, the options for continued study at the University are few.

Troyanek said the University used to offer graduate level Function and Clinical Anatomy classes, which were three terms long and more detailed than Human Anatomy I and II.

Due to budget cuts over the last two years, the graduate classes have been cut, and Human Anatomy has been reduced to two terms from three. Troyanek expects that next year the course may be reduced to one term.

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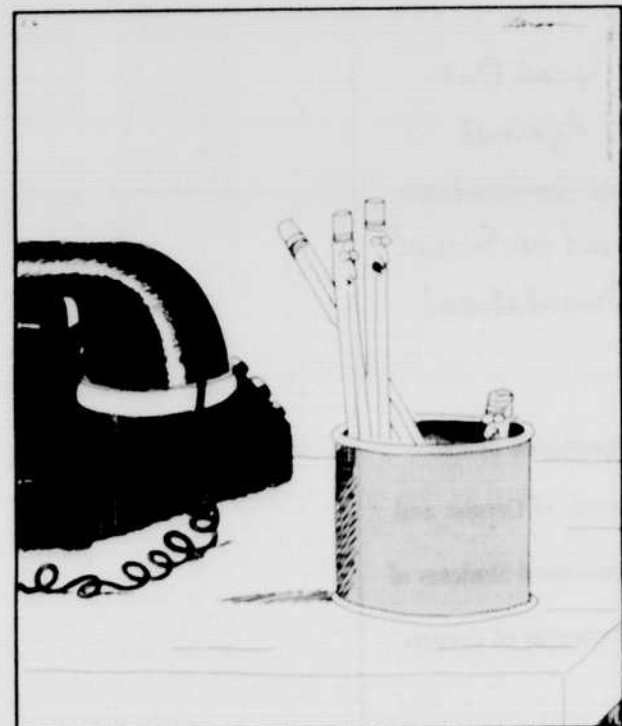
