New support groups to begin for assault survivors

Elisa Warner began by answering the crisis line and being on-call for women who needed immediate help getting to the hospital after being raped.

Now the University student will also be helping with one of the new weekly support groups that Sexual Assault Support Services will be starting Feb 17.

One of the four new groups

Warner will be co-facilitating is a drop-in group for all female survivors of sexual assault.

Other groups that will be of fered include a 10-week closed group for women who were molested as children and incest survivors, an open group for men who have experienced sexual assault, and an open group for women who have been sexually assaulted and raped as adults.

Warner said her role as co-facilitator will be to listen and try to help the women, encouraging them to share their feelings and interact.

Since the group is drop-in she said a lot of women who haven't talked about their feelings before will probably come.

The group will be a lot like the crisis line, except in person," Warner said.

Warner said the group will offer a momentary boost to help some women who aren't in a regular counseling program yet.

'I would recommend these

groups for people who aren't able to make a commitment to counseling yet and just need to talk," she said.

SASS volunteer coordinator, Erin Collier, said unlike the other groups that require an interview, the drop-in group is open to all types of people.

'Any women with any type of sexual assault can come, whether incest survivors or women who have just been raped, or women who were raped five years ago," she said.

have the groups so that survivors of sexual assault could receive more support.

"It's important for people to know that they're not the only one it's happened to," she said.

Collier said the groups not only provide an outlet for expressing feelings but also role models

Seeing other survivors of rape and incest who have dealt with their feelings and are now successful provides inspiration,

"This is where the healing can occur," she said. "People can get their feelings out in an open and safe environment."

Warner said her work volunteering can be demanding, but it's worth it.

"It can be hard at times listening to these women's stories," she said. "But it's really rewarding...You feel good afterwards, like you really made a difference.

Warner said she is also involved in organizing Students for SASS, an on-campus extension of SASS.

Another student involved in Students for SASS, Kristina Vatne, said they are presently getting organized, but eventually hope to work with other campus groups to promote awareness about sexual assault.


"We're hoping that once we get the ball rolling we will be showing films and making presentations about sexual assault issues," she said.
