

POLICE BEAT

The following incidents were reported to the Office of Public Safety and the Eugene police department from Jan. 30 to Feb. 5.

- The Kappa Sigma fraternity, 1090 Alder St., was cited Jan. 30 on a noise violation, according to police reports. An officer was sent out to investigate after a neighbor called in a complaint. The officer said he could clearly hear music coming from the Kappa Sigma house while in his car at 11th Avenue and Alder Street.

The house had a live band in the basement and a stereo upstairs. The house vice president accepted responsibility for the noise and told other house members to shut off the music.

- Police arrested a 27-year-old man, wanted in Idaho for selling cocaine, on Jan. 31. Police made contact with the man at 1147 Polk St.

The suspect was taken into custody and lodged at Lane County Jail.

- Police arrested a man for brandishing a switchblade in the EMU on Feb. 3. Police were dispatched to the EMU after an anonymous caller reported a man talking to himself and carrying a long switchblade in the EMU Skylight area on the

second floor.

An officer approached a man bearing the description of the subject. No knife was visible. The officer asked the man if he had any weapons on him and he said he did. The officer asked him to place his weapons on the bench next to him. The man then took out a spring style blade from the right pocket of his pants and placed it on the bench.

- A 22-year-old University student reported a case of harassment on Feb. 5. The woman and another University student said they were approached by a strange man in Waremart, 2101 W. 11th St., where they were shopping. The man told them his first name and asked if they were students. He also told the woman that she looked familiar and asked her major.

When the woman left the store, she found the man waiting for her. She said the man touched her hand, then told her she was beautiful and had an aura of innocence. When the woman's friend approached, the man left. The woman said the man appeared to be in his early 40s.

Coaching classes available for last time

Spring term will mark the last opportunity for students with coaching aspirations to take a coaching class at the University.

Susan Glenn, a physical education GTF, said the classes are open to all University students, not just coaching minors.

The classes offered are: soccer coaching, Wednesdays from 6:30 to 8:20 p.m.; baseball coaching, Tuesdays from 7 to 8:50 p.m.; track coaching, Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays from 9:30 to 10:20 a.m.; and Interscholastic Athletic Administration, Tuesdays and Thursdays from 9:30 to 11:30 a.m.

Since its initiation in 1981,

around 100 people have passed through the program, many of whom became assistant coaches at the University, Glenn said.

"If a person intends to coach on any level, they should enroll," she said.

The classes emphasize strate-

gy, management, sports psychology and other coaching aspects.

Glenn emphasized that even though the coaching classes are closing, the physical education activity classes will continue to be offered.

band director.

In light of this information, the IFC decided to reschedule OMB's hearing at the soonest possible date.

At Wednesday's meeting, the Survival Center received an allocation of \$12,212, an 11 percent decrease from this year's \$13,683 budget. The vote was 5-1-0 in favor of the decrease. Committee members noted that the Survival Center overspent \$1,000 in stipend allocations last year.

Oregon Voice magazine received a 2 percent increase from this year's \$2935 budget, up to \$2980. IFC members voted 5-1-0 in favor. The Oregon Student Lobby, which received \$30,868 this year, will receive \$31,500. The vote was 4-1-1 in favor.

A special request for the Latin American Support Committee to send 15 members to a conference in Berkeley, Calif., was denied 5-0-1.
