On Feb. 24, I witnessed a confrontation of an older man, Professor John Beebe, with an OPS officer, Otis Scarborough.

What I saw was the OPS officer stop a man for riding on the sidewalk. The man and officer argued about the citation being given, and both got their backs up. Angry, Beebe got on his bike to ride up to the post office. He did not hit the officer, but Scarborough ran and got in front of the bike, knocking Beebe off. 
