

Dancers to perform in Idaho competition

University dance majors and faculty members will perform in Moscow, Idaho this weekend at the American College Dance Festival, a regional competition among northwest universities and colleges.

One student and one faculty piece are selected from each school to be presented in the competition.

The student piece from the University, choreographed by Annesa Hartman, is called "Eclipse" and is performed to the beat of electronic music. Student Benji Thomasetti composed the music.

Not only is Hartman this year's choreographer for the student piece, she is also co-president of the group Dance Oregon, which sponsors dance activities on campus, including the trip to the festival.

Four people, including Hartman, are performing in Hartman's piece; they are Michele Bloom, Sandra Blake, and Kim Christensen.

Hartman is excited about attending the festival and says she feels privileged to be able to go.

Sherrie Barr, choreographer for the faculty piece, chose music by Bach and titled her piece, "Childhood Dreams."

Barr said she believes she is prepared for the festival and is pleased with the work and effort her students have put into the piece.

"I feel that my dancers really understand what I am trying to say with my piece," Barr said. "They have been working hard on it since October." The five dancers in Barr's piece are Bloom, Alison Rickenbaugh, Cindy Pierce, Pollyanna Lind, and Michelle Weaver.

Both Barr's and Hartman's pieces are examples of the University's focus on modern dance; however, many other genres will be seen at the festival.

The festival is not only a place for competition but is also a good learning experience for dancers.

"It's a great opportunity for students to see what is happening outside of our world and the kinds of dance other schools are doing," Hartman said.

Like Hartman, other students are looking forward to the festival and the experience it has to offer.

Of the fifteen people going to the festival, five are not competing at all; they are going for the sole purpose of learning more about dance. Prestigious dancers and dance instructors will be there to teach and critique the work of the participants.


