The Oregon women's basketball team lost 85-75 at California Saturday for the Ducks' seventh loss out of their last nine games.

Oregon dropped to 14-12 overall and 6-9 in the Pacific-10 Conference with the loss. California improved to 20-7 and 12-5 on the year.

California's Milica Vukadinovic scored 26 points and had a school-record 13 assists in the Golden Bears' win. Vukadinovic was 9 of 15 from the field and also grabbed nine rebounds.

The Bears' Trisha Stafford also scored 29 points in the

Guards Jossica Schutt and Missy Stowell led Oregon with 14 points apiece. Stowell hit 3 of 4 baskets from three-point range, and despite only playing 22 minutes, Schutt connected on 4 of 8 three-pointers.

Debbie Sporcich played only 17 minutes but scored 13 points for the Ducks. The sophomore forward also had 11 rebounds.

Oregon was playing its second game in a row without lead scorer Staci Wallenborn, who was attending her brother's funeral in Washington last week.

The Ducks end their season this weekend at McArthur Court, where they have lost five of their last six games. Oregon faces USC Thursday night and UCLA on Saturday.




