Ducks lose winnable Civil War, 62-54

□ Oregon plays Beavers tough until 10 minutes left in game, when Ducks fell apart, Oregon State goes on 11-0 run

CORVALLIS — The Oregon men's basketball team has suffered through more than its fair share of blowouts this season, but Saturday night's 62-54 loss to Oregon State in front of a full house of 10,400 at Gill Coliseum couldn't have been more difficult to swallow had it been by 50 points.

And it wasn't a disappointing loss just because it came at the hands of the arch-rival Beavers, who upped their record to 15-14 (7-9 in the Pacific-10 Conference) and kept alive their postseason hopes.

What made the seventh straight defeat so bitter for Oregon (6-19, 2-14) was the fact that the Ducks actually led 37-35 when Orlando Williams hit a lay-in with 10:55 left.

Oregon was keeping the ball out of the hands of the Beavers' biggest threat, 6-foot-10 center Scott Haskin, and Antoine Stoudamire and Williams were supplying enough offense that it looked as if the Ducks might just sweep the Civil War series in this, their worst season in recent memory.

As is usually the case in Civil War matchups, this was an emotional contest. And al-

though the Beavers had an overwhelming advantage in fan support, the Ducks weren't intimidated.

They kept their poise well into the second half.

Then, just as it has so often this season, the roof caved in on the Ducks.

First, Oregon State freshman Kareem Anderson hit a three-pointer to give the Beavers a one-point edge.

Then Karl Anderson picked up a loose ball from Stoudamire and was fouled by Potter. Seven seconds later Potter picked up another foul, his fourth. The Oregon freshman, who was primarily responsible for holding Haskin — the Pac-10's sixth-leading scorer at 17.9 points — to just eight at that point, was forced to sit down with 10 minutes left in the game.

That was the beginning of the end for the Ducks, as they turned it over twice in a row, both times leading to Oregon State three-pointers.

When Charles McKinney stole Chuck Patterson's pass and fed Scott Haskin for a dunk, the Beavers had run off 11 straight points in less than two-and-a-half minutes to lead 46-37.

Oregon State stretched that run to 23-5 and took its largest lead at 58-42 on Karl Anderson's dunk with 3:46 left.

"I feel for the players," Oregon coach Don Monson said. "They followed the game plan and did generally what we wanted them to

do and still lost. You can't say enough about the effort."

Monson said there was no doubt the 11-0 run was the game's turning point.

"In that type of game, you've got to hang close," Monson said. "Nine points, in that game, is a big margin."

"They capitalized on the mistakes we made, and that's why they won," said Stoudamire, who led all scorers with 28 points. "They made me work for my shots. I credit their defense for making me tired for a while out there."

Oregon's leading scorer looked anything but tired most of the game, however. Stoudamire had 12 of the Ducks' 20 first-half points and finished with more than half of Oregon's total.

The Ducks' slow-down double-stack offense didn't result in too many open shots. The Ducks ended up making just 6 of 20 field goals (30 percent), including only one of six three-pointers.

Oregon's sagging zone offense, which almost neutralized Haskin by positioning Potter in front and Patterson behind, did give the Beavers numerous looks at open jumpers, but Oregon State couldn't put very many down. The Beavers were just 8 of 26 from the field and only 2 of 13 from three-point range.
