POLICE BEAT

The following incidents were reported to the Office of Public Safety and the Eugene police department from Feb. 19 to March 4.

A University student reported an assault and robbery to police Feb. 27. The 20-year-old man said he was walking along Alder Street and 14th Avenue, when two men approached him and one of them stabbed him with a butterfly knife, according to police reports.

The suspect who stabbed the student then held the knife close to him and demanded his money, according to police. The men started to drag the student into an alley. They said, "You're going to die if you don't come in here with me" and continued demanding the student's money.

The student told the men he was in debt. One of the suspects then told him to remove his shoes, according to police. One of the suspects took the student's hamburger, which he had just purchased at a nearby store. The student was able to run away from the suspects. He then realized he had been stabbed and walked to Sacred Heart General Hospital.

• Police cited a 43-year-old transient for criminal trespass on the University campus March 1.

An EPD officer was dispatched to the scene after OPS officers saw two men at "the wall," a red brick area on the southeast corner of 13th Avenue and Kincaid Street, according to police reports. One of the men had been given a letter of trespass from the University. The EPD officer reminded the man of his letter of trespass and that "the wall" was University property.

The man said he remembered getting the letter of trespass but that the letter expired after one year, according to police. OPS told the EPD officer there was no date of expiration on the man's letter of trespass. The officer took the man into custody.

Police investigated an incident of childhood neglect in University's Westmoreland family housing March 2.

While on patrol around West 15th Avenue and Arthur Street, two EPD officers heard a loud scream that sounded like a child, according to police reports. When the officers checked the parking lot of Westmoreland family housing they found a three-year-old child alone and crying. The child had on only a pajama top and bottoms and slip-on tennis shoes with no laces.

The officers found a door open to one of the family housing apartments, according to police. Inside the officers found pictures of the child they found outside and a one-year-old infant asleep in a crib in the bedroom. The officers could not locate a parent or responsible person.

The officers called the Children's Services Division and arranged for the children to be taken to a foster home for the evening, according to police. While the police were waiting for the CSD to deliver a child restraint seat, the children's parents arrived one-and-a-half hours after the officers first discovered the children.

The 35-year-old father said he was a University student and that he and his 30-year-old wife had gone to his lab to turn off his computer.

Two men claiming to be OPS officers stole a University student's keys on March 3, according to police reports. A 19-year-old Dyment Hall resident told police she found one suspect rummaging through her cassette tapes. She said she also observed another suspect in the hallway next to her room carrying what looked like a walkie-talkie.

The woman asked the first man what he was doing in her room, according to police. The man replied, "We're trying to catch a guy in here." The woman said "What?" and the man told her they were campus security. He asked her where the guy with the walkie-talkie was and she pointed into the hall. The suspect then walked out of the woman's room and disappeared down the stairs.

Japanese study program offered

Oregon students have an opportunity to study Japanese language and culture without leaving the state through a new program.

The Oregon/Waseda Summer Program will bring together 30 Oregon students and 30 students from Waseda University — one of Japan's most prestigious universities.

Oregon students will room with Japanese students, study with Japanese students and participate in social activities with Japanese students in an intensive, residential, cross-cultural environment

The live-week program is sponsored by the Or-

egon State System of Higher Education, Waseda University, selected private Oregon colleges and universities, and the Oregon Partnership for International Education.

The program will take place July 22 to Aug. 29 at Lewis & Clark College in Portland.

Students who have studied Japanese language may enroll in intermediate or advanced levels of language instruction taught by Waseda faculty. Students with no prior experience may enroll in a course comparing Japanese and English Languages.

To be eligible, students must have completed their freshman year by June 1992 at an Oregon college or university, demonstrate a serious interest in Japan, maintain a minimum 2.5 grade point average, and live on campus during the program.

The \$1,700 fee includes 12 quarter hour of tuition, room and board, field trips and a three-day College Outdoors experience. University students may be eligible for financial aid.
