College drinking up

When it comes to books or brew, more students are choosing the latter, according to a study released by Michigan's Institute for Survey Research.

The 1991 survey of high school seniors and college students showed that the number of binge drinkers and daily drinkers among these groups have increased.

Binge drinkers are defined by those people who drink five or more drinks a day.

The study also cited evidence showing that the college-age population spends more on alcohol each year than on books. The study claims that the amount of money spent on booze each year is about \$5.5 billion for 430 gallons of alcohol.

Springfield gets tied

More than 200 classic neckties are on display at an exhibition called "Fit to be Tied" in Springfield.

The Springfield Museum will display the ties until April 4, which includes such gems as one designed by Salvadore Dali and vintage ties from the 1940s and 1950s.

The ties are from a collection of more than

2,000 belonging to Dr. Ronald Spark of Tucson, Ariz.

"My ties reflect the American spirit between World War II and the Korean War," Spark said. "They're gaudy and glorious creations of tie manufacturers and clothing designers. This was a time of optimism and relief when the ex-GI was coming home and wanted some splash and color after years of conformity."

Senate nets fish bill

Oregon Sen. Bob Packwood announced last week that the U.S. Senate passed a bill that would end drift net fishing earlier than the deadline created by the United Nations.

Drift nets are particularly harmful to sea creatures because they entrap and kill not only fish, but any other ocean life that gets caught in them. The U.N. resolution called for a moratorium on

high-seas drift nets by Dec. 31, 1992.

Packwood said in a letter that the bill passed by both the House and Senate would speed up the ban by requiring the president to impose sanctions on any fish products or fish from a country in violation of the ban.

However, before being enacted, the bill must still be approved by the president.
