## New technology modernizes student job search

□ Students use new computer to do the footwork

**J**ob hunting will soon be as easy as a touch of a few keys.

Come April 7, students can access a new career information software program at the office of Career Planning and Placement Service at Hendricks Hall, the Counseling Center and Academic Advising Office in Oregon Hall.

"Job Link" and "Job Track" carry a listing of companies hiring within the country complete with specific descriptions of the job as well as a contact number and address. In addition, "Job Link" offers such details as the scale of the company, its subsidiaries, and primary product and service.

Those interested in an overseas career can access a third program, the International News Server, which lists career opportunities anywhere in the world from Canada to Australia. The listings are updated weekly.

Even if you're only starting to reflect on your interests and are not sure which field you'd



like to get into, the network can help set you on the right track.

SIGI, or System of Interactive Guidance Information, directs students in their selection of a major and tries to make a match with career op-

tions in the market.

"This special network is another resource in an array of possibilities students can seek out in their search for a job," said Larry Smith, director of Career Planning and Placement Service. "Students are

encouraged to use as many resources as possible, and our computer career information system gives them an additional option that's fast, easy and efficient." According to Smith, the University is one of the few campuses in the coun-

try that offers students this computer career service.

The network, which was set up over the spring break, is still in its pilot stage, but its expansion will include more information on full-time careers, part-time and summer jobs, and internships.

Sophisticated as it is, the system, said Smith, is easy to use. The network can be accessed just by following a few simple instructions.

The computer career information service is free and to use it, you either drop in or sign-up. Students who own a DOS-based IBM or compatible work station can access the campus career network. For more information, call the Career Planning and Placement Service at 346-3235.
