Health center funding student phone survey

Questionnaire will help in developing student programs

A handful of randomly chosen students will be receiving rather unusual phone calls beginning Friday.

The University Student Health Center is funding a survey of 600 random students to answer questions about personal health care, how effective they think the health center is, and other health care questions in general.

The survey, the first ever of its kind at the University, will be used to develop programs to meet the needs of students and gain further knowledge of what students think about health issues and their own personal health care, said health center director Gerald Fleischli.

Participants will be asked some very personal questions regarding personal health care, in addition to the other issues, Fleischli said.

"They will be asked questions about sexual activities issues which could be specific about things like condom use, sexual assault and body image," Fleischli said.

The health center made a \$6,500 contract with the Bureau of Sociologic Research at the University of Nebraska to conduct the survey by phone.

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New van rules proposed

University changing policy one year after a student death

A public hearing is scheduled on five proposed administrative rules governing vehicles operated by University students, employees and volunteers on official University business. The proposed Oregon Administrative Rules follow recommendations made by the University's Accident Review Board after an accident involving a state-owned van on April 4, 1991 in Nevada. The accident killed University student Susan Winn and injured several others during a trip sponsored by a student organization.

The proposed rules apply to state-owned vehicles and hired vehicles (OAR 571-10-100).
