Former UAW head to offer advice

The former president of the United Auto Workers of America will offer his perspective on how to make America more globally competitive in a free talk Friday at the Eugene Hilton.

Douglas Fraser will speak at noon in the Conference Center Lobby of the Hilton on "Innovative Labor-Management Relations and America's Competitive Future."

Fraser's three decades of experience in the auto industry is especially relevant at a time when President Bush has just returned from negotiating with Japanese auto-makers and global competitiveness is an election year buzzword, said Steven Deutch, a University sociology professor.

The auto industry employs one in six Americans, and is "central to the economic lifeblood of the country," Deutch said. He said this is why Fraser's gains in strengthening labor's voice and participation in the auto industry have been so important.

Deutch said Fraser's speech will also be of interest to those trying to improve efficiency in Ore-

gon's government and to those concerned with expanding labor skills and options in declining industries such as timber.

Fraser is co-teaching the class Sociology of Labor this term with Deutch as an occupant of the University's Wayne Morse Chair of Law and Politics.

Now a professor of labor studies at Wayne State University in Detroit, Fraser was the first union representative appointed to the Chrysler Corporation's board of directors.

Fraser has been called the last of the "pioneering generation" of labor leaders and has made great strides in bringing labor and management together, Deutch said.

In addition, he's helped change labor contracts at Chrysler to include restrictions on compulsory overtime, a comprehensive health and safety program and improved early retirement and pension plans.

The former member of the AFL-CIO's executive council has also been involved in national policy discussions on mass transit, civil rights, peace, health care and economic development issues.

The films will cover various human rights struggles in the 20th century, including the forced incarceration of Japanese-Americans during World War II and the mistreatment of the Navajo tribe. Panelists include Guadelupe Quinn, chair of the Chicano Affairs Board, and Diane Wong, Assistant to President Brand for Affirmative Action.

For the Gay and Lesbian Rights symposium, David William Foster, regents' professor of Spanish at Arizona State University, will give a lecture on "Gay and Lesbian Sensibil-

ity in Latin America" at 3:30 p.m. in Room 180 PLC.

At 7:30 p.m., Yvonne Yarbrow-Bejarano will speak on "The Lesbian Body in Latina Cultural Production: Expanding Race and Gender Categories in Gay and Lesbian Studies." Yarbrow-Bejarano, an associate professor of romance languages and comparative literature at the University of Washington, will present the lecture in Room 115 Lawrence Hall.

April 10 will feature a panel discussion on censorship and oppression featuring Foster, Yarbrow-Bejarano and San Francisco lawyer Mary Dunlap in Room 100 Willamette Hall.

After the panel discussion, a social hour will be held at 5 p.m., also in Room 100 Willamette Hall.

At 1:30 p.m. in the Law Center, attorney Elden Rosenthal will present "The Skinhead Murder Trial: Reflections of the

Trial Lawyer," followed by Professor Charles Wilkinson's "Indian Tribal Sovereignty in the Nineties and Beyond" at 2:30.

On Saturday, the final day of the symposiums, Foster will present a seminar workshop on gay and lesbian literature in Latin America at 9 a.m. in Room 109 Friendly Hall.

At 10:30 a.m., the two symposiums will sponsor a joint lecture called "Lesbian and Gay Rights in the Nineties." Mary Dunlap, a lawyer from San Francisco whose practice emphasizes civil rights litigation, will give the lecture in Room 129 Law Center.

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about Trojan's safety.

The Nuclear Regulatory Commission has estimated that there is a 45 percent chance that there will be a core meltdown at a U.S. nuclear plant by the year 2005.

"That means that the odds are 200 to 1 that there will be an accident at Trojan," Jerry Wilson said. "I don't know why anyone would accept those odds. How many lottery tickets would you buy if you could hit on a 200 to 1 shot?"

Safety concerns were renewed last year when the plant went off line because of an electric inverter failure. During the shutdown, hundreds of seals on the plant's radiation containment build-

ing needed replacement.

State engineers also reported that there were problems with Trojan's steam generators. According to *The Oregonian*, the generators may need to be replaced at an estimated cost of \$200 million.

The Do It Yourself Committee initiative would saddle PGE shareholders with the cost of decommissioning Trojan.

Jerry Wilson hopes that the campaign's early start will help its chances.

"We want to penetrate deeply and early in the campaign," he said. "Hopefully we've inflicted a wound from which (PGE) can't recover."

Do It Yourself Committee organizers will be recruiting campaign volunteers in Eugene during the May street fair.
