Speakers address racism experiences

A University law student chilled the crowd with a personal story of racism Thursday, setting the tone for a weekend of diversity-aimed lectures at the law school.

Jane Suskin, a second year law student, told about her experiences five years ago living near Grants Pass with a friend. Her friend's son, a five-year-old African-American, was followed by several Ku Klux Klan members on his way home from school. In full regalia, they told the boy to leave town immediately.

"She didn't feel like she could go to the authorities." Suskin remembered, "because the Klan were the authorities."

As a result, she and her son had to leave.

Suskin was one of five speakers at the EMU rally, co-sponsored by the law school. The rally opened the "Celebrating Human Diversity" conference that will run through Saturday

Dave Frohnmayer, dean of the law school, shared his personal experiences with discrimination. A a high school student in southern Oregon, he was shocked to discover the mayor and leading citizens of his town were all Klan members. He said it awakened him to the frightening reality of racism and the growing need for diversity in Oregon.

"We are only a generation away, or perhaps a day away, from discrimination against our brothers and sisters," Frohnmayer said "Diversity by my definition is having an identity within a community...In the law school, we must be a part of that identity, otherwise we and our society will revert to a

kind of tribalism."

Donna Albro, director of Affirmative Action at Lane Community College, said true diversity can happen only if people recognize their similarities rather than differences.

"We need to realize who we are as human beings," Albro said. "Who we are with respect to the past, the present and the future. We need to realize that what happens in Africa happens here. What happens in Antarctica happens here. All our destinies are linked in terms of existing as human beings. The linkages between us are stronger than the differ-

Clarence Spigner and Dominick Vetri also expressed frustration at the bigotry and lack of diversity they see on campus and in the state.

Vetri, co-chair of President Brand's Task Force on Lesbian, Gay and Bisexual Concerns, said the diversity conference tells gays and lesbians and people of color that the University values their presence.

He criticized the Oregon Citizens Alliance, repeatedly calling them "Oops Crackpots Again," and expressed hope that people will recognize the roots of bigotry.

Suskin said she was concerned about who wasn't represented at the University, a theme reiterated by most of the speakers. She urged people to observe the world outside of the University, and not to believe everything the University

"People have to turn off the TV, to not trust the newspapers," she said. "We have to see for ourselves what's happening on the street. We need to look around for the issues that aren't talked about."
