## Ducks win Nike golf tournament

Two Oregon women's golf teams finished in the top half of the Oregon State Women's Nike Invitational over the weekend in Corvallis, led by five individuals in the top 10.

The Ducks split their nine-woman squad into two teams for the tournament and both scored impressive finishes. Senior Beth Manczak was the low individual for the Ducks, tying for second place with an 11-over-par 227 for the three-round event.

The Ducks' first team won the event, pulling away from Washington in the final round for a four-stroke victory over the Huskies.

Oregon was in third place after shooting a first-round 314 but came back to post a 302, followed by a 299 in the final round. Washington was tied with the Ducks after the second round but could not keep up the pace, falling to a 303 in the final round.

The Ducks got two big lifts in the final round

from Leigh Hornung and Karly Mills, who both shot a 2-over-par 74 to lead Oregon to the victory. Oregon's low round for the tournament was Shannon Meier's 73 in the second round. Meier finished in fourth place for the tournament, followed by Hornung in fifth.

Oregon's second team finished fourth at 958, six shots ahead of Oregon State. Freshman Shannon Hare led the second squad, firing a 230 for the tournament that was good enough for a sixth-place finish overall.

This tournament showed Oregon's depth as the Ducks second squad defeated the best teams put out by four schools, including Pacific-10 Conference rivals Oregon State and Washington State. Oregon's first team destroyed the Beavers and Cougars, beating them by 49 and 63 strokes, respectively.

The Oregon men's team began play in the Western Intercollegiate at Santa Cruz on Monday, with play continuing through Wednesday. The Ducks are led by the tournament's defending champion Doug DuChateau and Jeff Lyons, a two-time winner this year.

## Netters narrowly beat WSU, lose to Huskies

Little did the the Oregon men's and women's tennis teams know that their separate trips to Washington over the weekend would finish with nearly identical results.

The men's team traveled to Seattle for dual matches against Washington and Washington State at the Huskies' Lloyd Nordstrom Tennis Center, and the women were in Pullman to take on the same two schools.

Each Oregon team split the series, as both narrowly beat the Cougars (men 5-4, women 6-3) and were whitewashed by the Huskies (men 9-0, women 5-0)

The Duck men, now 11-12 on the season, not only came up empty on the scoreboard in matches, but as a team they couldn't win a set against a Husky team that was too generous in handing out goose-eggs a week before Easter.

Sophomore Lee Kirner, at No. 1 singles, and freshman Josh Prager, at No. 5 singles, provided the best competition against the dominating Huskies, as they each won six games before falling short in their matches.

Kirner fell to Washington's Chet Crile, the Pacific-10's 1991 Northern Division Player of the Year, 6-2, 6-4. In the meantime, Prager, forced into the action because of various Duck injuries, kept his match close before being defeated 6-3, 6-3.

Injured Ducks Ted Thoren (back) and Rob Atkin (eye infection), who ordinarily play singles, didn't make the weekend trip. Coach Buzz Summers said their absence was felt.

"The injuries were a factor," Summers said. "It's nice to have a choice whether or not to play some guys."

Even a couple of the Ducks that made the trek north were hampered by more than bruised feathers. Senior Chris Gladwell continues to play with a torn anterior cruciate ligament in his right knee, and junior Kevin Settlemyre has been bothered by torn cartilage in his left knee.

"It's like one knee is 20 years old and the other one is 50 years old," Summers said of Settlemyre.

Gladwell fell to his Washington opponent 6-1, 6-1, and Settlemyre took the day off to rest.

Settlemyre was pushed to the limit on the previous day against Washington State before falling short in the third set, 1-6, 6-2, 6-4.

In other action against Washington State, Oregon's Kirner (7-5, 6-4), Nick Smith (6-4, 4-6, 6-3), Ryan Marasigan (7-5, 7-5) and Prager (6-1, 6-2) were all victorious in singles.

The Oregon men journey to Portland this afternoon, challenging the Portland Pilots at 2.30.

Despite being shut out in terms of matches won, the Oregon women's team had a little more success against the Huskies.

Four of the five singles matches went the distance, with Oregon's Katie Glynn coming the closest to victory before falling 6-3 in the third set of her No. 4 match.

Sophomore Sherry Fairgrieve, playing No. 2 singles, split the first 20 games with her Husky opponent, 6-4, 4-6, before dropping the final set 6-1.

No. 3 singles player Krissy Barger's match was almost a carbon copy of Fairgrieve's, as Barger split the first two sets 7-5, 5-7, and then lost 6-1 in the third.

Freshman Heather Updike also forced a decisive third set in her No. 5 singles match, before coming up empty, 6-0.
