

RALLY

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Carl Hosticka, University professor and member of the Oregon House, said students must be today's leaders when it comes to tax reform.

"Our current political leadership is paralyzed and unable to deal with the issue of Measure 5 and its effects on our society," he said. "Basically, what we have is a group of people who are doing quite well — their taxes are going down, they are making money off this thing and they don't care about the rest of us."

"We have a group of leaders who are afraid to stand up to them and say you can't do this to our society," Hosticka said. "You have to have things like higher education and human services because we are all in this together."

"Know that a vote is forthcoming," said Cynthia Wooten, legislative candidate for District 41. "And every single person in every district is going to be saying they can't afford it, that they don't know why the money is necessary."

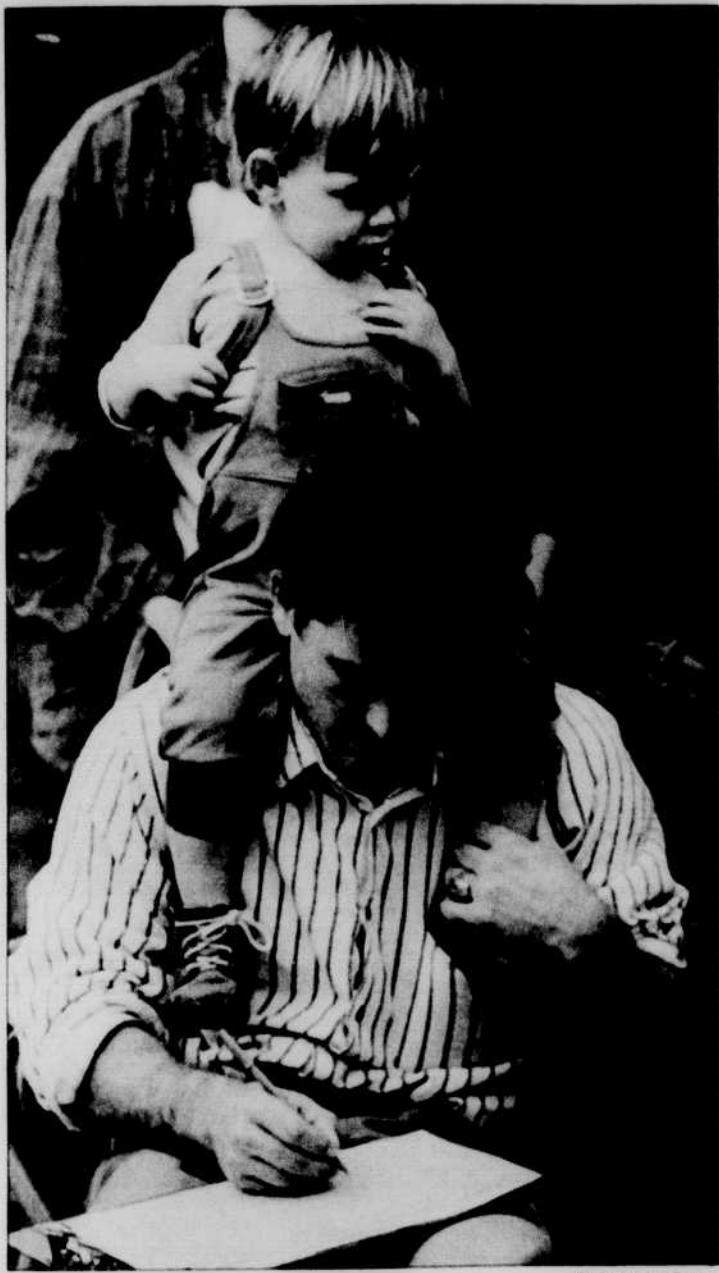
"It's going to be up to every one of us to tell them why, and to tell them now."

Sam Pierce, a student who led a successful fight against a \$450 tuition raise at the School of Architecture and Allied Arts last year, said the time may be coming when students will be forced to pay 100 percent tuition.

"What that means," Pierce said, "is that a lot of people here now will not be able to attend. It means there will be a two-tiered society, which goes along with the concentration of wealth. The people who can afford it, will get the best service; the people who can't afford it won't get shit."

"We cannot accept this as reality," Pierce said.

ASUO University Affairs Coordinator Ryan Deckert said the AAA students uniting to stop a tuition increase is a good example of how to

face the upcoming struggle with funding for higher education.

"The message is that we don't have to be defeatist," Deckert said. "If we stand united together we can have our voices heard and we can make an impact."

The voter registration drive will continue throughout spring term around campus. Several other Oregon colleges

and universities have held or will hold tax reform rallies this month, and are also participating in the voter registration drive.

The effort culminates on May 1, when a caravan will take students from Oregon, Oregon State, Southern Oregon and Western Oregon to a rally on the steps of the state capital.
