## **Chris Bauman**



Chris Bauman, candidate for a one year IFC seat, is a sophomore majoring in international business and Japanese. She is a member of the Residence Halls Governance Council and

ODE: Do you favor acrossthe-board cuts as a means of keeping fees low?

Bauman: I think if we're going to take a lot of cuts, they need to be taken equitably not specifically in one area, but there are areas that they can afford to cut more.

ODE: How would you ensure that every group gets a fair hearing and a fair budget?

Bauman: It's been brought up that as (the IFC) gets toward the end of the year and they're hearing the final budgets. they're cutting more and more because they have less. I think that's obviously unfair.

ODE: Do you believe it's appropriate to hold current group directors accountable for mismanagement by former direc-

Bauman: Well, what's done is done. But each case should be taken as it comes

ODE: Would you favor cutting large budgets to compensate for increasing or maintaining the budgets of smaller groups?

Bauman: The reason certain groups have large budgets is because they need more. I think if budgets are going to be cut, they shouldn't necessarily take a lot from the larger budgets and just a little from the smaller budgets.

ODE: Why should students vote for you?

Bauman: I have a lot of experience that I could use to turn things around that have maybe gone wrong or just haven't been looked at from the right angle.

## Teresa Naillon

Teresa Naillon, candidate for a one-year IFC seat, is a freshman majoring in psychology. She is a member of MEChA, the Latino/Chicano student group, and a tutor for the High School Equivalency Program.

ODE: Do you favor acrossthe-board cuts as a means of keeping fees low, and if so how

Naillon: Definitely not. 1 don't think it's really fair because a lot of the groups are going to be more drastically cut than others. They're going to cut to meet a certain amount, and once it goes beyond that, the other groups won't be cut or else they won't be cut (as

ODE: How would you ensure that every group gets a fair hearing and a fair budget?

Naillon: By looking over their budgets in great detail and trying to be as fair as we can with allocating monies to each organization, as well as cutting where necessary

ODE: Do you believe it's appropriate to hold current group directors accountable for mismanagement by former direc-

Naillon: Mistakes in budgeting shouldn't be the current director's responsibility, but it is their responsibility to fix it.

ODE: Would you be in favor of cutting large budgets to compensate for increasing or maintaining the budgets of smaller

Naillon: The smaller groups are very essential to this cam-



pus for keeping diversity here, and I don't think that they should suffer. With our EMU, the whole system is top-heavy and it needs to be reconstructed. A lot of other groups are suffering because that cannot

ODE: Why should students vote for you?

Naillon: I feel that I am qualified for this position. I feel responsible. I've been interested in IFC throughout the year, attending different budget hearings, and I have an idea of what they do. I think I would be a good representative of the stu-

I think that oftentimes, because of my interaction with MEChA, I get looked at with a label as being a MEChA member. But my interest is for the students, and I'm running for this position as a student.

## **Chris Wall**

Chris Wall, candidate for a one-year IFC seat, is a junior pre-business administration

ODE: Do you favor acrossthe-board cuts as a means of keeping fees low?

Wall: That would be more detrimental than anything. There are some groups that need the money they get and I feel there are some groups that may be wasting their money that can be trimmed up a little.

ODE: How would you ensure that every group gets a fair hearing and a fair budget?

Wall: I think the only way to ensure that is to be sure that everyone knows in advance. It's important for every group to know when their hearing is going to be and what's going to be expected of them.

I know all these groups are familiar with the process and they've been through it, but it's necessary to remind them.

ODE: Do you believe it's appropriate to hold current group directors accountable for mismanagement by former direc-

Wall: To a certain degree they are responsible because no



one becomes a director of a program without substantial prior involvement. In many of these programs, there are only a few people that are running them, so generally there's a natural progression to a higher position and everyone needs to be responsible for their group.


ODE: Would you be in favor of cutting large budgets to compensate for increasing or maintaining the budgets of smaller groups

Wall: No. Most of the large budgets are for programs that serve a lot of people, such as the EMU, Saferide and child care. By cutting their budgets, you might jeopardize the programs.

ODE: Why should students vote for you?

Wall: I think by having no prior experience in any of the groups, I can bring a fresher perspective than other people who are continually around it.
