IFC CANDIDATE PROFILES

Steve Hargin

Steve Hargin, candidate for a two-year Incidental Fee Committee position, is a sophomore pre-journalism major.

ODE: Do you favor across-the-board cuts as a means of keeping fees low, and if so, how much?

Hargin: I don't favor across-the-board cuts because I think there are some groups that are more important than others, but at the same time, if anyone benefits from a group, I think it's important that they receive funding. I think (each group's budget) should reflect the percentage of interest of the student body.

ODE: How would you ensure that every group gets a fair hearing and a fair budget?

Hargin: There could be more involvement before the hearing between the IFC and the groups that are receiving funding. I think the IFC should go into it more prepared for each hearing so that they run more efficient.

ODE: Do you believe it's appropriate to hold current group directors accountable for mismanagement by former directors?

Hargin: No, not by former directors. I don't think you should have to pay the last directors' mistake, and hopefully in cooperation with the IFC you can set it up so it's allocated more fairly this time.

ODE: Would you be in favor of cutting large budgets to compensate for increasing or maintaining the budgets of smaller groups?

Hargin: I think you have to take each group individually. I don't like to generalize with a blanket statement. I think Saferide is very important and I think it should be increased, not cut, and the same with child care. I think the student publications are also very important.

It's hard to cut something without feeling that someone's going to suffer from it because everyone benefits from a group.



ODE: Why should students vote for you?

Hargin: I think my inexperience is a benefit because there are no limitations on my ideas. I don't have something already stopping me from attempting to set something up. I'm going at it with fresh ideas.

I've seen the IFC and it seems very inefficient the way it's run now. I also think that there's a way we could make the EMU more self-supporting.
