Intrasquad game full of big plays

For the avid football fan who has not been satisfied with the play in professional spring leagues, Autzen Stadium was the place to be on Saturday.

A good-sized crowd showed up to watch the Oregon football team hold its annual spring intrasquad game, which was full of exciting big plays, one after another, no helmet-cam necessary.

As expected, the Green team, consisting of players on the first-team depth charts, dominated the White 41-14 in a game that featured a touchdown on a long run from scrimmage, one on a punt return, another on a kickoff return and one more on an interception run-back.

The breakaway nature provided head coach Rich Brooks with some hope of bettering last year's season performance.

"We didn't have enough big plays after the first two games last year," Brooks said. "After today, I think we have some new faces who are capable of making big plays."

One of the newcomers who caught the attention of Brooks was flanker Derrick Deadwiler. The redshirt junior from San Diego made a strong case for himself to be the Ducks' kick returner in the fall with his 99-yard kick return for a touchdown to open the second half.

Deadwiler also caught three passes for 72 yards, including a pretty one-handed stab of a Doug

Musgrave 14-yard pass.

"Deadwiler may not always make the sure catch like (senior Anthony) Jones, but when he does catch it, he's exciting," Brooks said.

The performances of Deadwiler and senior Ronnie Harris, who returned a punt 81 yards for a touchdown and made three receptions for 36 yards, makes the flanker position the most competitive on the team.

"I wish we had the depth of competition (that we do at wide receiver) at all positions," Brooks said.

Although he hesitates to name a starter at quarterback, Brooks said the general outlook at the position is stronger than last spring.

"The quarterback play was spotty and erratic, but we are ahead of where we were last spring," Brooks said. "Nobody's jumped up and said 'this is my position and you're the contenders.'"

Sophomore Danny O'Neil, listed as No. 1 entering the scrimmage, connected on five of his 15 attempts for 88 yards, but he also threw two interceptions. As Brooks pointed out, all the blame can't be put on the quarterback.

"It's hard to make a solid judgment on the quarterback position because a lot of what they are able to do depends on what the guys up front do and what the receivers do," Brooks said.

The performance of Musgrave, No. 2 at quarter-
