oner, Barbara Rodgers and Jose

Sara Dodge and Wendy Vejlupek were chosen to fill the two EMU board seats.

The overall voter turnout of 14.2 percent - 2,402 ballots cast - was better than in the last weeks primary when 13.1 percent voted.

Ballot Measure 4, supporting the fee reduction, was rejected by voters 805 to 1,348. Holly Ferguson, former ASUO vice presidential candidate, cosponsored the measure and seemed disheartened by the news it had lost by such a considerable amount.

'It seems an interesting coincidence that approximately 1,200 people voted for Lee/Fore and about the same amount of people voted for this ballot measure," she said. "Obviously the same group of people are

getting their own agenda passed.

Fred Hagen, a sponsor for the ballot measure that would discontinue fees, expressed faith in those who voted in favor of his measure, but was upset about the way voters received information. Hagen's measure lost 493 to 1661.

"I think that's pretty good considering the monopoly student government has on stu-dents," Hagen said.

Hagen also said the student government put out flyers against his measure and gave an incorrect account of what would really happen if the measure were to be approved.

"If they had to lie and misrepresent my ballot the way they did then I think (the resuit) was pretty good," he said. "If they would have talked about it honestly then people would have voted for it. I am pretty happy because there are at least 493 students who know how to think for themselves.


Nature's Warning Shot by Dr. Paul Engelking, University of Oregon Across from the EMU in Willamette Fiall, Room 100


