Honecker returned to Germany



- Erich Honecker, the former East German

leader, was returned to his homeland Wednesday and arrested for ordering the shooting of Germans who tried to escape his Communist dictatorship.

Honecker, who supervised construction of the Berlin Wall in 1961, was flown in from Moscow shortly after 8 p.m. (2 p.m. EDT). He was driven to Mosbit prison, not far from where the Wall stood before Honecker's overthrow three years ago caused it to tumble.

Honecker, who had holed up with his wife in the Chilean Embassy in Moscow in December after Russia refused him sanctuary, is accused of ordering border guards to shoot to kill anyone trying to flee East Germany during his 18 years in

From 350 to 400 East Germans died trying to escape East Germany over 40 years; at least 49 were killed under Honecker's watch.

While many Russians believed the 79-year-old Honecker should be allowed to live out his days in Russia, Germany pressed Chile and Russia to re-

Officials said he would be tried before the end of the year.

"Now justice can take its course," said federal Justice Minister Sabine Leutheusser-Schnarrenberger, in a statement issued in Bonn. "Mr. Honecker will receive a fair trial in Germany under the rule of law.

"It is not a matter of revenge but rather the attempt to satisfy justice under the rule of law.

The trial will be a severe test of Germany's legal system, and is certain to be followed avidly by 16 million East Germans who are struggling with their lives in united Germany and were divided over the wisdom of trying Honecker.

Second black prisoner dies in South Africa

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — A black prisoner plunged to his death Wednesday, becoming the second man to die in custody since the release last week of a report alleg-

to die in custody since the release last week of a report alleging that police routinely kill suspects.

Police spokesman Andy Pieke said the 29-year-old robbery suspect, whose name was not released, climbed over a barrier and fell from an eight-story building while guiding police to other suspects. No other details were given.

On Sunday, a 24-year-old man collepsed and died in police hands. A report on Sunday and January and January

lice hands. A report on Sunday quoted Dr. Jonathan Gluckman, a top South African pathologist, as saying police

had killed scores of prisoners in recent years.

Gluckman's allegations and the two deaths have focused public attention on the embattled police force. The government has promised an investigation of all prisoner deaths in the past two years, but the African National Congress and hu-

man rights groups are demanding an independent inquiry.

The ANC said that the man who died Sunday, Bongani Makhubela, was a member of the black opposition group, and demanded an explanation of his death. Makhubela's father, Makheya, told The Star newspaper of Johannesburg his son was healthy when he visited him Saturday following his arms ton wearons charges. rest on weapons charges.

Makhubela said he tried to visit his son Sunday but was

told to return the next day. On Monday, Makhubela said a police officer told him his son had collapsed and died.

Police said an autopsy would would be conducted to determine the cause of death.

The police have been linked to a series of recent controversies that have thrown the country into its worst crisis since de Klerk came to power three years ago, while weakening the credibility of his government's claim to be leading the coun-

try into a new, multi-racial era. Last month the ANC accused the police of complicity in the massacre of 42 blacks at the township of Bolpatong, and broke off negotiations with the government on a new political system and constitution.

A team of British experts investigating the killings blamed them largely on police incompetence.


