Students in poll speak out on Perot

A handful of University students surveyed in an informal campus poll said a three-way contest will add interest to the presidential race but likely will not result in Ross Perot's election.

Perot announced his candidacy Thursday afternoon with 33 days remaining before the Nov. 3

John Sluta, a junior in English, said he believes Perot's move will divide the parties and siphon votes from President Bush, giving the Democratic

Sluta questioned Perot's method of determining support for his campaign. The Perot camp established an 800-number callers could dial to register support of his candidacy.


The number accessed a pre-recorded message thanking callers for their support but did not allow for any dissenting opinions. Callers intending to state disagreement were chagrined to find that their calls automatically registered support.

Erika Josted, a senior in philosophy and political science, called Perot's announcement "an ego ploy." Josted said a three-way contest would benefit Bush rather than Clinton.

"I don't think (Perot) significantly has a chance to win," Josted said.
