

# Oregon sweeps meets

Oregon's two cross country teams pulled off a weekend sweep, winning meets in Seattle and Salem.

The Oregon women won their second straight meet, edging out Washington by only nine points to win the Sundodger Invitational in Seattle on Saturday. Oregon placed four runners in the top 10, including senior Nicole Woodward, who won her second race of the year.

Woodward, who has won the individual title at both of the Ducks' meets this year, covered the 5,000-meter course in 17:03, almost 10 seconds ahead of second-place finisher Sarah Howell of Abbotsford, Canada. Woodward won the Simon Fraser Invitational last weekend with a time of 17:13.

Oregon sophomore Jenna Carlson was the fourth collegiate runner to finish the race, which included six college teams and one Canadian club team. Carlson ran the course in 17:28 to finish in the top 10 for the second consecutive race.

Freshman Heidi Van Borkulo-Goldstein was the third Duck to cross the finish line, coming in at 17:32. Van Borkulo-Goldstein also finished in the top 10 at both Oregon meets this season.

Erika Klein, the Ducks' only other senior, finished 10th with a time of 17:42. Her time was 35 seconds faster than last week's, when Klein finished 11th at the Simon Fraser Invitational.

The only other Duck to finish in the top 20 on Saturday was sophomore Jill Callero, who finished the race in 18:03 for a 19th-place finish. Monica Davidson and Joni Wareham were next for the Ducks, finishing side-by-side in 21st and 22nd place, respectively. Davidson's time was 18:17, one second ahead of Wareham.

Also finishing for Oregon were Niamh Zwagerman and Ann Patton with times of 18:29 and 19:23, respectively.

Sally Maier, a sophomore from Portland, has decided to redshirt this season for the Ducks. Maier, who was expected to be a top runner this year, has missed the opening two meets of the season with a swollen Achilles tendon.

The Oregon men's team won the Willamette Invitational for its first team title of the season. The Ducks edged out Central Oregon Community College by eight points for the win. Oregon finished with 29 points, and Central Oregon had 37 points.

Karl Keska and Tracy Hollister, the two runners who finished highest for the Ducks in the Mountain West Classic a week ago, were held out of this week's race by head coach Bill Dellinger. As a result, the Ducks had the chance to see how deep they are, and a few runners took advantage of the opportunity.

Oregon junior Jason Humble finished fifth in the 8,000-meter race with a time of 24:38. Two

# Ducks defeat Beavers, win first Pac-10 game

The frustration of a disappointing four-game losing streak was quickly forgotten Friday night as the Oregon volleyball team convincingly defeated intrastate rival Oregon State 17-15, 15-9, 15-4 for its first Pacific-10 Conference victory.

Middle blocker Stephanie Warren, who had been limited to just 13 kills the pre-

vious weekend against California and Stanford, exploded for a season-best 20 kills. Despite implementing several different blocking schemes against Warren, the Beavers could do little to stop Warren's at-will scoring.

"This match was a matter of pride," an excited Warren said after the three-game sweep. "We've had a rocky start to our season, mostly because we're a young, inexperienced team. Tonight, we

felt we had to finally prove ourselves."

Game one was especially satisfying for the Ducks as they were able to accomplish something they hadn't done all season: come from behind for a win.

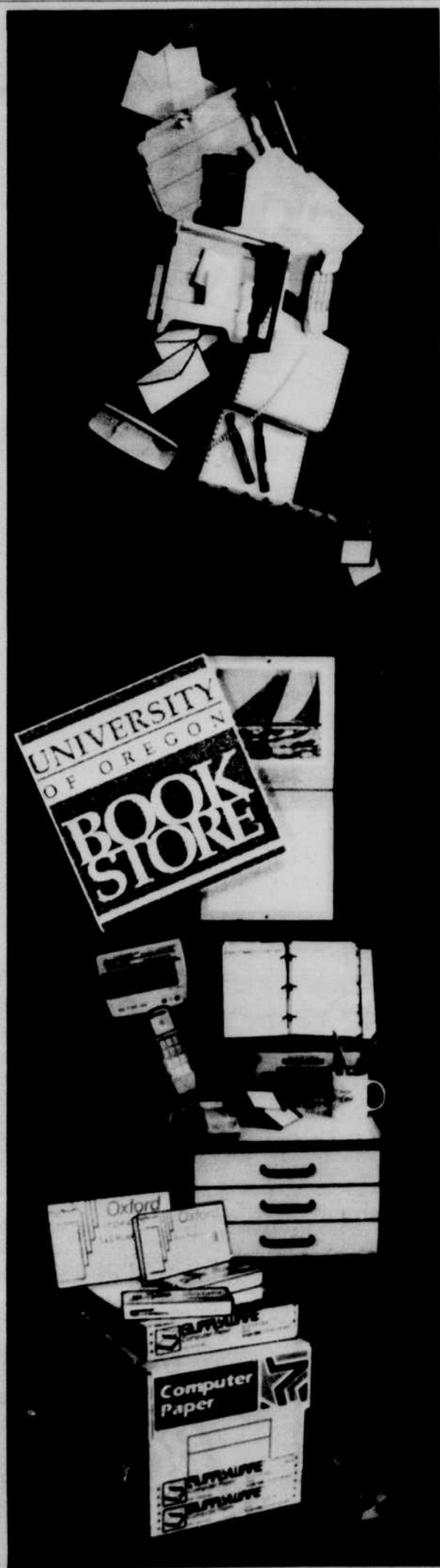
With Oregon State ahead 14-10 and serving for the game, outside hitter LaReina Woods made a crucial kill to prolong the game. Marcie Price and Warren then combined for four points, allow-

ing the Ducks to draw even.

Oregon State tried to regain its composure by calling a timeout, but it was too late for the Beavers as the momentum had already swung to the Ducks. A Kalie Kerr block and an Oregon State attack error sealed the 17-15 win.

The come-from-behind win was exactly what head coach Gerry Gregory had been wait-
