are coming out for the first time often worry about what their families will think.

"It can be a lot to bear," he said. "Students wonder, 'Are my parents going to write me off or stop paying my tuition?' It's not just a fantasy fear. Sometimes that's the reality."

Coming out is a lifelong and even daily process, and coming out to yourself is the first step, said Jackie Balzer, University coordinator of educational and support ser-

vices. Balzer's job is to raise awareness on campus about gay, lesbian and bisexual issues.

"It can happen at anytime," she said. "Someone can be married for 15 years and wake up one day and de-cide she's a lesbian and get a divorce."

Balzer said everyone comes out in their own way and at their own time.

"There are some people shouting it from the rooftops and some people sharing it with three close friends," she said.
