

# Alpha Lambda Delta receives Torch honor

The members of last year's chapter of Alpha Lambda Delta received the Order of the Torch award last Wednesday, Oct. 14.

This is the second time in three years that the University honor society received this award.

The Order of the Torch, only given to two or three chapters nationwide, is based on an annual report submitted by each chapter. The chapter's visibility on campus, community service record and support for academic achievements is also considered.

The report submitted by the University chapter included details on the chapter's fund-raising activities for a local AIDS hospice and Food for Lane County, as well as its volunteer service with Ducks on a Roll.

Aaron Menikoff, one of two senior advisers to this year's members, attributed the chapter's success to strong leadership, particularly from Roger Morris, the chapter's faculty adviser, and Natanya Myers, last year's chapter president.

"She was a great leader," Menikoff said. "She was inspi-

rationally at meetings and very in charge. She was committed to finding strengths and weaknesses of all the officers and using them. She was one of the main reasons we won the award."

The award was presented to the chapter by Dr. Joanne Trow, vice president for student affairs at Oregon State University and the past executive director of Alpha Lambda Delta.

During the awards ceremony, Trow spoke of the importance of having honor societies on campus. She also spoke on how the higher education system is realizing the value of community service in the educational process and how the service activities of honor societies are a reflection on the campus.

Membership in Alpha Lambda Delta is based on a student's freshman year fall and winter term grades. Potential members are invited to join during the spring term of their freshman year and are usually the most active during their sophomore year.

"It's an amazing way for freshmen to get their foot into how the University system works," Menikoff said.

# Guatemalan injustices presented

Maria del Rosario, a member of the International Representation of the Committee for Peasant Unity, will speak Tuesday in the EMU about Guatemalan history, her organization and 500 years of resistance.

The Community in Solidarity with the Central American People and the *Student Insurgent* are co-sponsoring the visit by del Rosario. Lisa Petke, CISCAP director, said del Rosario will be speaking about issues that are rarely discussed in the press.

CISCAP brings a speaker from Guatemala every year with the aim of educating the community, reinforcing the movement against U.S. intervention in the region and helping to raise material aid, Petke said.

del Rosario is from the Guatemalan province of Quiche and has worked with the Committee for Peasant Unity (CUC) since it was founded in

1978. CUC seeks to access arable land for growing subsistence crops, improve wages for farm workers and eliminate political violence.

According to research done by the Network in Solidarity with the People of Guatemala, there is an average of 60 disappearances of civilians every month in Guatemala.

In addition to a discussion of the past and present situation in Guatemala by del Rosario, there will also be a photo exhibit on "The Communities of Populations in Resistance" in the EMU upper-floor art gallery.

The photo exhibit opened Sunday and runs until Nov. 1. On Oct. 20, there will be a reception at 5:30 p.m. in the EMU Gumwood Room to officially open del Rosario's exhibit.

On Oct. 21 at 4:30 p.m. and 5:45 p.m. in the Walnut Room, there will be a documentary titled *Paths of Silence*. The documentary will be shown again on Oct. 27 at 4:30 p.m. and 5:45 p.m. in the EMU Ben Linder Room.
