CISCAP brings a speaker from Cuatomala every year with the aim of educating the community reinforcing the movement against U.S. intervention in the region and helping to raise matorial aid, Petke said
del Rosario is from the Guatemalan province of Quiche and has worked with the Committee for Peasant Unity (CUC) since it was founded in
1978. CUC soeks to access arable land for growing subsistence crops, improve wages for farm work ers and eliminate political violence Solidarity with the Pepple Cine Nerwork in Solidarity with the People of Guntermala, thore is an average of 60 disappearanees of civilians every month in Cuatomala.
In addition to a discussion of the past and pres. ent situation in Cuatemala by del Rosario, there will also be a photo exhitrit on "The Communities of Populations in Resistance" in the EMU up-per-floor art gallery
