

Today, OCA spokespersons repeat daily lies and false opinions about the behavior of homosexuals. These lies are repeated in the Voters Pamphlet. Passage of Ballot Measure 9 would mean these lies and opinions would be engraved on Oregon's Constitution. How would that affect Oregon's future history?

I know that Christians, whatever their Biblical interpretation viewpoint may be, recognize lying and vilifying as a serious sin. Particularly, when doing this would adversely affect so many innocent and good people.
