gram and the assessment used to evaluate Samoan students.

The center has also worked with the Oregon Department of Education to improve the transition of students with disabilities from high school to adult life.

Now the WRRC is helping Western states provide students with technology such as the computer "voice" theoretical physicist Stephen Hawking uses. The WRRC helps solve funding problems and develops policies for deciding which students should get such technol-ogy, Zeller said.

The latest grant brings the center's federal support total to more than \$22 million since its founding 23 years ago.
