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## AT&T gives award to Duck kicker

Oregon kicker Tommy Thompson added another award to his trophy case this week when he was named the recipient of the AT&T Long Distance "field goal" award for his performance in the Ducks' 24-3 loss to Washington Saturday.

Thompson, a junior from Lompoc, Calif., kicked a 56-yard field goal in the fourth quarter of the Ducks' defeat to claim the award. The 56-yard kick is the second longest in Oregon history, trailing only Roy Geiger's 57-yard kick in 1977. Thompson's kick came after he missed a 51-yard attempt earlier in the game.

The award is Thompson's

third of the year, following two Pacific-10 Conference special teams player of the week awards.

The Pac-10 first awarded Thompson the special teams prize after the Ducks' 16-13 victory over Texas Tech in September. Thompson kicked the first three field goals of his career and an extra point against the Red Raiders, accounting for 10 of the Ducks' points.

Two weeks later in the Ducks' 30-20 victory over Arizona State, Thompson connected on five of six field goals, including one from 51 yards. The five field goals tied the all-time Oregon record for field goals in a game.

"He is the most talented kicker I have ever coached," Oregon head coach Rich Brooks

said. "And that includes my years in the NFL."

Thompson signed with Oregon in the fall of 1990, following an outstanding career at Lompoc High School.

During his freshman campaign with the Ducks, Thompson averaged 40.6 yards per punt. During the 1991 season, Thompson's averaged dropped to 37.9 yards per punt, but his 71 punts were returned for only 77 yards.

This season Thompson has connected on 11 of his 18 field goal attempts and is ranked 15th in the country in punting.

AT&T has donated 400 dollars to the NCAA's Degree Completion Scholarship Fund. Thompson will be awarded an engraved plaque in recognition of the achievement.

## Runners in top 10

Sunday's performances in the Jeff Drenth Memorial put both the men's and women's cross country squads in the top 10 rankings of teams in the nation.

The men's team is ranked ninth in the nation after winning the Drenth Memorial, defeating previously sixth-ranked Notre Dame. The Fighting Irish's second-place finish at the race dropped them six places to No. 12.

The women's team is ranked eighth in the weekly coaches poll after finishing second to Wisconsin at the Drenth Memorial. The Badgers remained No. 3.

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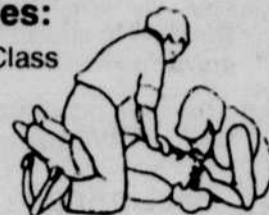
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
