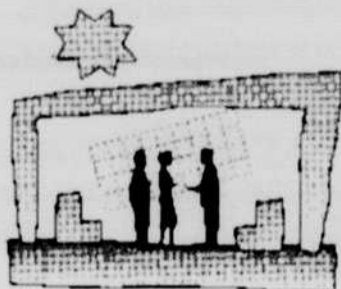

role.
Thompson kicked four field goals and bailed out the Ducks' stalling offense in the first half with all nine of Oregon's points.
In the first quarter, the Ducks started two drives in Cougar territory but were unable to move the ball. Thompson came in and nailed kicks of 38 yards and 32 yards, respectively. His 46-yarder in the second quarter gave the Ducks a 9-0 lead.
Leading 9-3 in the third quar-

ter, Oregon put the game away with 21 points in 10 minutes.
Running back Sean Burwell scored first on a 5-yard pass from quarterback Danny O'Neil with four minutes left in the third quarter. Burwell capped off another touchdown drive on a three-yard pass from O'Neil with 11 minutes left in the fourth quarter.
But the play that killed the Cougars came when safety Chad Cota picked off a Bledsoe pass, returned it 38 yards to the goal line and then fumbled it right into the hands of safety Eric Castle in the end zone.
