Men brick opportunity at Stanford

The Oregon men's basketball team led by five at halftime, but blew it in the second half, losing to Stanford 71-66 in Palo Alto Saturday

The loss put the Ducks in an early-season hole at 0-2 in the Pacific-10 Conference. Saturday's game was one of Oregon's best chances to win a Pac-10 game on the road, as the Cardinal came into the game at 5-7 overall and were picked by many to finish near the bottom of the conference.

The Ducks simply didn't capitalize on the opportunity.

Oregon shot a season-low 38 percent from the field, but still managed to build a 28-20 lead in the first half, thanks to five of eight shooting from threepoint range.

Oregon missed 11 of its first 14 shots in the second half as the Ducks watched Stanford turn a 32-27 halftime deficit into a 37-37 tie five minutes into the second half.

The Cardinal continued to roll and built an 11-point lead with five minutes left in the game. Oregon cut the lead to 64-61 with one minute remaining, but Stanford hit five of six free throws in the final minute to put the Ducks away.

Two games into the Pac-10 season, Oregon is already starting to resemble last year's Duck team that relied heavily on the scoring of Antoine Stoudamire. For the second straight game, Stoudamire was the only Oregon player to score in doublefigures, with 20. Stoudamire hit seven of the Ducks' 19 field

The same Duck team that had 32 assists two games ago against Hartford had only 12 dishes against Stanford.

Brent Williams scored a career-high 25 points for the Cardinal, and point guard Marcus Lollie scored 11 points and had 11 assists.

The good news for Oregon is that it returns home for a game Thursday at McArthur Court. The bad news is the Ducks will have to face 10-3 UCLA. Saturday night, the Ducks will face 8-3 USC at Mac Court.

Stanford upped its league record to 1-1 on the season after losing to Oregon State in its Pac-10 opener.

egon came back to tie the game 34-34 at halftime.

The game remained close throughout the first 14 minutes of the second half before Stanford began pushing the ball inside to 6-foot-3 Val Whiting, 6-foot-3 Rachel Hemmer and 6foot-5 Anita Kaplan to wear the Ducks down. Whiting, Hemmer and Kaplan combined for 34 points in the second half, just four points less than Oregon's team total of 38 points.

When Wilson fouled out, they didn't have the size to match up against us," Stanford head coach Tara VanDerveer said. "I think our depth hurt them; we were able to put in fresh people, and they couldn't.'

The Ducks stayed competitive during the first two minutes after Wilson fouled out and trailed only 72-67 after a free throw by Cindy Murphy

Murphy came off the bench to lead the Ducks with 17 points and seven rebounds. Missy Stowell scored seven points and dished out seven assists for Oregon.

Oregon finished the game shooting only 41.5 percent from the field, and Stanford shot 64 percent in the second half to end the game at 51.5 percent.

The Ducks now travel to Los Angeles to face UCLA on Wednesday and USC on Saturday.
