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**Refrigerator dropped from PLC**

A dorm-style refrigerator was dropped off an external balcony of Prince Lucien Campbell Hall sometime last week, the Office of Public Safety said.

OPS said it was contacted Monday and advised that a refrigerator was found in pieces at the base of PLC, below the building's external balconies. OPS said it did not know when the object was dropped.

OPS called the University Physical Plant and told it to come pick up the refrigerator on Monday, said John Evans, Physical Plant safety coordinator.

Concerns over the safety of the PLC balconies were renewed last November when Monica Margaret Abrams, 23, committed suicide by jumping

from the ninth-floor balcony of the campus's tallest building.

In the past, a moped, a bowling ball, a vending machine and numerous other items have been thrown from PLC's balconies.

The Campus Safety Advisory Committee discussed fencing in the PLC balconies in January 1990, but decided against it.

four civilians were wounded.

"Fight against them as you fought the enemies of God before, and extinguish the fire of hatred in the muzzles of their weapons," the Iraqi leader said in a speech monitored in Nicosia, Cyprus.

"The criminals came back, carrying their spite and their tools of evil," Saddam said in the nearly 10-minute address.

He urged the Iraqi military and its air defenses "to turn the skies of Iraq into a lava against the oppressors from north to south, east and west."

"Each aircraft of theirs in the sky of Iraq is a target for your weapons. Use the name of God and you will find them wrecked, God willing."

Jets aircraft attacked permanent anti-aircraft missile and radar sites at Tallil, Najaf, Samawah and Amarah in southern Iraq, as well as a number of mobile missile sites near Basra and Nasiriyah, Hoar said.

At the White House, presidential spokesman Marlin Fitzwater said the targets involved the surface-to-air missile batteries that had been used to threaten allied aircraft policing Iraq's southern no-fly zone, as well as the batteries' "associated infrastructure" — the sites and radars used to control the weapons.

Tensions with Iraq mounted last week, when Saddam moved the mobile anti-aircraft missiles and their guidance radars into a ready-to-shoot configuration within the no-fly zone set up to protect the Shiite minority in the south.

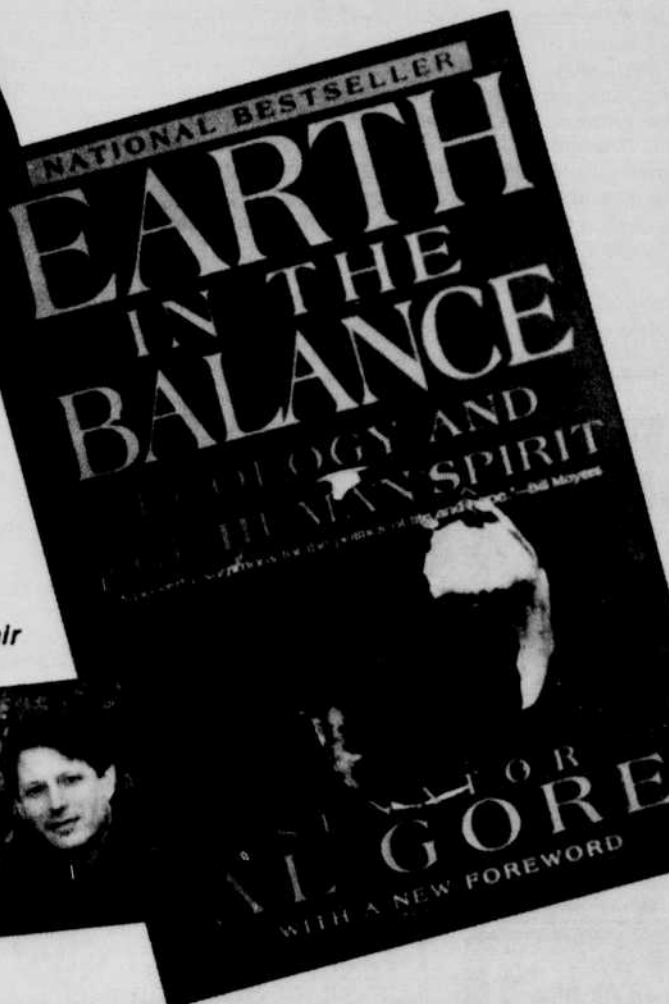
